- Employ separation of duties (e.g. deposit preparation vs. A/R Posting)
- Exercise independent review and oversight
- Document all procedures and review for security gaps
- Conduct surprise audits
- Control vendor and master files and cheque writing capabilities
- Restrict access to personnel master records
- Review employee access privileges regularly and immediately if an employee changes departments
- Restrict system module access in a manner consistent with separation of duties
- Move as many cheque payments as possible to electronic payments such as EFT, wires and eTransfers
- When using cheques, control cheque stock, safety paper, and access to storage areas. Store blank cheques, safety paper and cheque printing and signing equipment in secure areas. Destroy obsolete cheque stock.
- Consider two signatures for every cheque issued
- Have the right person(s) review and sign disbursement documents
- Preauthorize any high value payment
- Carefully establish security procedures and controls of vendors you do business with
- Consider who can authorize purchasing transactions
- Establish dual control, a clear audit trail and separation of duties for employees involved in initiating and approving electronic payments



Hello, municipal colleagues,

Thank you to everyone for being engaged in the Strong Communities Build Alberta provincial election campaign. We are pleased with the exposure we received on issues impacting municipalities leading up to the election. We look forward to engaging with the new government to ensure awareness and understanding of the important role of municipalities and the need for appropriate and adequate resources.

In his <u>victory speech on Tuesday night</u>, Premier-elect Jason Kenney referenced the importance of working with Quebec to gain their support for getting Alberta resources to market for the benefit of all Canadians. We are pleased to hear this as it aligns with one of our federal advocacy priorities, the **Resource Communities of Canada Coalition (RCCC)**.

RCCC is gaining momentum, with 46 communities having passed resolutions in support of the RCCC. By bringing together municipal associations and municipalities from across Canada, we can coordinate advocacy for responsible resource development and ensure our perspectives are heard on issues impacting municipal government and operations.

RCCC differs from other municipally-focused groups being formed:

- Our focus extends beyond Bill C-69 advocacy;
- We are taking a strategic approach by partnering with municipal associations and municipalities across Canada; and
- We are asking for support, not money.

Here is an update on RCCC's first three activities.

1. Support Canadian Energy campaign at FCM Conference in Quebec

Attached is our draft campaign plan for educating elected officials at the FCM Conference. The plan has been created with the input and advice of many stakeholder groups and experts. Work is being done to hone the activities and messaging to ensure it resonates across cultural and geographic boundaries and starts respectful conversations about the benefits the energy sector brings to municipalities. - More municipal infrastructure projects falling under federal review

Additional financial and administrative costs being added to municipal operations

Attached is our submission document to the Senate Standing Committee. We intend to do more advocacy work around Bill C-69. Stay tuned for more information.

3. Formally establish the Resource Communities of Canada Coalition

We will be developing the Terms of Reference for RCCC after the educational campaign at the FCM Conference. We will also be focusing on our approach for the upcoming federal election.



Introduction

The Alberta Urban Municipalities Association (AUMA) was founded in 1905 and today represents over 260 of Alberta's cities, towns, villages, summer villages, and specialized municipalities. As the voice for Alberta's urban municipalities, AUMA appreciates the opportunity to bring forward municipal perspectives on Bill C-69, an *Act* to enact the *Impact Assessment Act* and the *Canadian Energy Regulator Act*, to amend the *Navigation Protection Act*.

Navigation Protection Act

Primary area of impact to municipalities: Bridges that cross water bodies in Alberta

Municipalities are responsible for the construction, maintenance, and upgrades to the majority of bridges that cross water bodies in Alberta. As part of the transportation network, bridges connect communities, provide access to community services, support tourism, and are key infrastructure for various industries important to Alberta's economy.

The following outlines how proposed changes to the *Navigation Protection Act* would adversely impact municipalities.

1. Federal review of small-scale projects: Proposed amendments to the Navigation Protection Act may reverse improvements made to the legislation in 2009 and 2012. The previous amendments helped address municipal concerns regarding federal review of small-scale projects, which were causing significant delays and incurring unnecessary costs.

Impact: Returning to the requirement for federal review of small-scale projects will cause unnecessary delays, which will be of particular concern for projects with federal and/or provincial grant funding with timeline requirements. The review requirement may also impact the ability for municipalities to access infrastructure grant funding.

Recommendation:

- That the Government of Canada explore amendments to the Act to limit federal review of small-scale projects. If the Government of Canada is committed to overseeing all projects on navigable waters, then it is recommended the approval agency explore measures to limit delays and costs to municipalities.
- That the Government of Canada amend the *Canadian Navigable Waters Act* to explicitly state that the prohibition in section 3 and the obligations in sections 5 and 10 do not apply if there would be no interference with navigation.
- **2. Lack of definitions for work categories**: Bill 69 does not include definitions for key aspects including defining what constitutes major work versus minor work and includes a newly-proposed category that is not considered major or minor.
 - **Impact**: Lack of clarity is concerning as the regulations will ultimately determine the scope of administrative responsibilities being added to municipal governments.

Recommendation: That the Government of Canada release draft versions of the proposed regulations so municipalities can fully understand the expected impact of Bill C-69 before the Senate makes its decision on the Bill or the Senate propose amendments to define key terms such as minor and major works in the Act.

3. Lack of definition for the term "interference:" Section 64(4) of the proposed amendments designates that any works that slightly interfere with navigation will be considered minor works and any works that substantially interfere with navigation will be considered major works.

Impact: Municipalities need guidance on whether interference relates to the navigability of the vessel or is measured by changes to water level or water flow.

Recommendations: That the Government of Canada amend the *Canadian Navigable Water Act* to include the definition of "interference."

4. Expanded scope of regulation for scheduled and non-scheduled water bodies: The *Navigation Protection Act* currently uses a schedule to define each water body subject to federal oversight. Bill C-69 creates a complex system of requirements for approval depending on the scope of work and whether the water body is scheduled or non-scheduled; however, there is lack of clarity on these requirements.

Impact: Without additional clarity, municipal governments will be challenged to self-determine whether a bridge project requires federal approval. In its current form, Bill C-69 creates an environment where municipalities may seek federal approval for all projects - even when not necessary - to avoid potential violation of the *Canadian Navigable Waters Act*. This type of regulatory environment should be avoided to limit costs on taxpayers.

Expanding federal regulation to include unscheduled water bodies will quite possibly increase the administrative burden on municipalities when planning bridge maintenance projects. This will result in increased administrative/engineering costs as well as a longer pre-planning period for projects that will have no impact or limited impact on navigation.

Recommendation: That the Government of Canada release draft versions of the proposed regulations so that municipalities can fully understand the expected impact of Bill C-69 before the Senate makes its decision on the Bill or the Senate propose amendments to define key terms such as minor and major works in the Act.

5. Lack of prescribed timelines for approval: The proposed amendments create a new process and timeline for project proponents to conduct public consultation, but it does not set out timelines for when the Government of Canada must make a decision on an application.

Impact: Alberta's municipalities operate in a winter climate where there is a limited number of months when construction can take place. The lack of timelines imposed on the approval agency can cause delays and may risk the success of a project as well as the municipality's ability to meet funding timeline requirements.

Recommendation: That the Government of Canada amend the *Canadian Navigable Waters Act* to define the time period within which the Minister must make a decision on an application.

6. Responding to emergencies: Section 10.4 of the proposed amendments allows the Minister to authorize work in various circumstances even if the obligations in sections 5 and 10 are not met.

AUMA supports the Federation of Canadian Municipalities in calling for section 10.4 to be expanded to address the unique needs of communities in the event of an emergency.

Recommendation: That the list of criteria in section 10.4 of the *Canadian Navigable Waters Act* is broadened to include social disruption or a breakdown in the flow of essential goods, services, or resources in order to adequately acknowledge the hardship and complexity created by damaged infrastructure in an emergency.

Impact Assessment Act

Primary area of impact to municipalities: Large-scale projects and municipal consultation

As the government closest to the people, municipalities have a unique understanding of the potential impact of large-scale projects on the local environment, economy, and health of citizens. It is essential there is an open and transparent process where municipal governments are consulted on projects that fall under the *Impact Assessment Act*.

AUMA supports the "one-project, one review" objective that Bill C-69 strives to achieve and the broadening of scope assessment to include economic, social and health impacts, both positive and negative, on local communities.

AUMA is concerned that the current reading of the Act doesn't consistently reflect this objective. For example, the term "jurisdiction" as defined in the Act doesn't include municipalities. AUMA is also concerned with the potential opportunity for political interference in the impact assessment process. In spite of the rigorous, arms-length assessment process and structure, sections of the Act still allow for expanded Ministerial discretion into the process.

The *Impact Assessment Act* and processes must be balanced to ensure projects of merit proceed in a timely manner so municipal projects and job-creating efforts are not thwarted; investments and use of grant funds made available to municipalities must be utilized.

The following outlines how proposed changes to the *Impact Assessment Act* would adversely impact municipalities.

1. Lack of definition of a "designated project" and the scope of federal oversight:

Although the focus of the *Impact Assessment Act* is for large-scale projects, the *Act* does not clearly define what is considered a "designated project."

Impact: The lack of definition makes it unclear what types of municipal projects could be subject to federal oversight. Until that information is available, it is difficult for AUMA to understand and provide feedback on the *Impact Assessment Act*.

Recommendation: That the Government of Canada release a draft definition of a "designated project" so municipalities can fully understand the expected impact of Bill C-69 before the Senate makes its decision on the Bill or the Senate propose an amendment to define a "designated project" in the Act.

2. Lack of consultation with municipal governments: The proposed *Impact Assessment Act* does not recognize the value of local knowledge that municipal governments have with respect to projects that may be proposed in local regions.

Impact: It is essential the Agency has all relevant information regarding local context and impacts before rendering a decision on a project application. Municipal governments are local stewards of the land and have unique knowledge that can assist a review panel. As such, there needs to be a clear and transparent process for the Agency to consult municipal governments that may be affected by a proposed project.

Recommendations:

- That the Government of Canada amend relevant sections of the *Impact Assessment Act* to expressly require consultation with impacted municipal governments.
- That the Government of Canada amend section 22(1) to include "comments from a municipal government impacted by the designated project" as one of the factors that must be considered by the review panel.
- That the Government of Canada amend the definition of jurisdiction to include municipalities.

Canadian Energy Regulator Act

AUMA's observations and recommendations are focused on municipal government perspectives, which are less affected in the *Canadian Energy Regulator Act*. AUMA is pleased the Act does not include in its scope water or wastewater pipelines used solely for municipal purposes.

AUMA's general concern with the Act is that it not become a conduit to delay or deter energy infrastructure projects of merit. Alberta and Canada have resource-based economies and the sustainability of our communities relies on a healthy resource sector.

Of particular concern is the removal of the "standing test" from the *National Energy Board Act*, which is used to determine interested parties that can participate in public hearings. Removal of the standing test has the potential to create project delays, ineffective consultation, and investor unease, all with no value being added to the process.

AUMA also strongly disagrees with the position of the Federation of Canadian Municipalities that suggests the Commission consider the input of all municipalities, regardless of whether they are located directly along the route of a proposed pipeline or transmission line. As noted before, allowing this will only create project delays, with no value added to the consultation and evaluation process.

Issue: While it is important the Regulator collect input from a diverse range of stakeholders, public input should be limited to persons or organizations that live or operate within reasonable proximity to the proposed project area or offer technical expertise that is relevant to the project.

Recommendation: That the *Canadian Energy Regulator Act* be amended to maintain the "standing test" to ensure that public hearings only involve input from municipalities or communities located directly along the route of a proposed pipeline or those that could be directly impacted in an adjacent municipality.

- That the Government of Canada amend the *Canadian Navigable Waters Act* to define the time period within which the Minister must make a decision on an application.
- That the list of criteria in section 10.4 of the *Canadian Navigable Waters Act* is broadened to include social disruption or a breakdown in the flow of essential goods, services, or resources in order to adequately acknowledge the hardship and complexity created by damaged infrastructure in an emergency.

Impact Assessment Act

- That the Government of Canada release a draft definition of a "designated project" so municipalities can fully understand the expected impact of Bill C-69 before the Senate makes its decision on the Bill or the Senate propose an amendment to define a "designated project" in the Act.
- That the Government of Canada amend relevant sections of the *Impact Assessment Act* to expressly require consultation with impacted municipal governments.
- That the Government of Canada amend section 22(1) to include "comments from a municipal government impacted by the designated project" as one of the factors that must be considered by the review panel.
- That the Government of Canada amend the definition of jurisdiction to include municipalities.

Canadian Energy Regulator Act

• That the Canadian Energy Regulator Act be amended to maintain the "standing test" to ensure that public hearings only involve input from municipalities or communities located directly along the route of a proposed pipeline or those that could be directly impacted in an adjacent municipality.

Re: March 11, 2019 Collision

On March 11, 2019 at approximately 5:25 am (we had just arrived back in Canada from a week long vacation), I was travelling south bound on 51 st. towards my home when I struck a ridge of ice that the Village maintenance person left while he was clearing man holes. I did not strike the ridge very fast – approximately 35 km/hr, however the impact my car made with the ridge caused myself and my family – Eldon Kostynuk and Lemonee Kostynuk, to surge forward so much so, that the seatbelts tightened, holding us back. We did not receive any personal injury from the impact, however my SUV sustained major damage.

My vehicle was able to be driven and while I knew something was damaged, I was waiting until my next service to have it assessed. Due to my work schedule with Alberta Elections, I was forced to postpone the service appointment until April 4, 2019. That is when the quote was provided. I was advised the car was driveable but long trips should be avoided. I have not been able to make the repair appointment until after the April 16 election (hence the late writing of this letter).

I have enclosed Vermilion Chrysler's Service Department's email that explains the damage.

Attached please find a copy of the quote to have the struts replaced and 4 new tires. I am only asking the Village of Innisfree to replace the 2 front tires and repair the struts. As the tires were due to be replaced late summer/fall, the damage has forced me to purchase new tires 4-6 months sooner than budgeted for.

I have had a second quote done from Squatch Auto in Vermilion, AB (780) 853-9777, to replace the struts only and it was \$50 less that Vermilion Chrysler. As Chrysler has maintained my 2016 Jeep Cherokee Trailhawk since I bought it new, I will be having that dealership do the repairs.

I have attached photos of the ridge of ice and the intersection where I hit. You can actually see where I hit and continued driving. Please note that there are no barricades, pylons or flagging to indicate the ridge of ice. My insurance agent commented on the lack of barricades or even "smoothing" of the ridge and indicated that it was lucky we weren't hurt from the impact.

I have communicated with councillor Deb McMann about the damage and her advice was to write a letter stating damages, and the Village would consult their insurance. Please advise me of your decision at your earliest convenience.



Municipal Development Plan

The purpose of a Municipal Development Plan is to plan for the future use of land. It is a key policy document that communicates the long-term desired land use for the community. It is a high-level plan that shows how the community is expected to change over time and the shape it will take in the future.

Village of Innisfree

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Introduction

The *Municipal Government Act*, Revised Statues of Alberta, 2000 requires all municipalities to prepare and adopt a municipal development plan (MDP). The Act states that an MDP must address such issues as future land use and development in the municipality, the provision of municipal services and facilities, and inter-municipal issues such as future growth areas and the co-ordination of transportation systems and infrastructure.

The overall purpose of the Village of Innisfree's MDP is to guide the future growth and development to ensure that it is sustainable, orderly, appropriate, complementary, efficient, and that it enhances the quality of life for the citizens of Innisfree.

The MDP is primarily a policy document that can be utilized as a framework for the physical development of the community within which both public and private sector decisions can occur. As a policy document it is, for the most part, general in nature and long-range in its outlook. The MDP provides the means whereby Council can evaluate the immediate situations or proposals in the context of a long-range plan for Innisfree.

This MDP exhibits the community goals and aspirations for the future as contained in the vision statement. Goal statements that reflect the long-term vision have been provided to guide future planning and development. Goal statements arise at the beginning of each policy section and provide a framework for the objectives and policies within each section. The goals of the community are enabled through key objectives which in turn are supported through the MDP polices and guidelines. The plan is divided into various categories or topic areas; yet, each category builds upon the other to capture the intended long-range vision.

Finally, it should be acknowledged that this MDP is a living document. As the Village of Innisfree grows and adapts to changing circumstances, the plan may require revisions to ensure categories or topic areas remain relevant.

1.1 Interpretation

The MDP is general in nature and is intended to provide a long-range outlook of the community. It is intended to guide council, administration, developers and the community members when considering growth and development.

Map 1 is a Future Concept Map (see appendix) and may evolve overtime. It is intended to act as a guiding plan based on the assumptions made while preparing the MDP.

It is recommended that the entire MDP document be read to provide context to policy statements. Policies are written using "shall", "should" or "may" statements. The interpretation of "shall", "should" and "may" that follow provide the user with a greater understanding of the intent of each policy statement.

- "Shall" denotes compliance or adherence to a preferred course of action.
- "Should" denotes compliance is desired or advised but unique/extenuating circumstances may make compliance impractical, premature or unnecessary.
- "May" denotes discretionary compliance or a choice in applying policy.

1.2 Planning Hierarchy

An MDP is a statutory plan and is influenced by other pieces of legislation. Figure 1 provides a simple overview of the planning hierarchy.

1.3 Public Engagement

Prior to developing the MDP, council and administration undertook a strategic framework session facilitated by a consultant. The session resulted in a vision, mission and set of guiding principles for the Village. A public information night followed and the strategic framework was presented to the public. At the public meeting, roundtable/group discussion related to current

and future planning/development needs took place. The information was compiled and is reflected throughout the MDP.

To further engage the public, a Stakeholder Draft MDP report was prepared and made available to the public. Personal invitations were sent to key stakeholders such as the County of Minburn for comment. Before approval of the final plan, there was a public hearing.

2.0 Community Context and Trends


2.1 Regional Setting

The Village of Innisfree is located at the intersection of Yellowhead Highway No. 16 and Secondary Highway 870 in central Alberta. Innisfree is nestled along the CN rail line is 145 kilometers east of Edmonton and 109 kilometers west of Lloydminster, Alberta and has many access points. It can be accessed from Highway 16 running east and west, Secondary Highway 870 running north and south, or surrounding Township roads. The intersecting highway connections provide great accessibility to the Village.

2.2 Population Changes

Figure 2 highlights Innisfree's population statistics from 1950 to 2016.

The Village of Innisfree's population increased 67 percent between 1913 and 1960 which was primarily driven by local economics in both agriculture and oil/gas activity. The population trend has since experienced a relatively consistent decline since 1960.

According to Statistics Canada, the average family size has become smaller over time. Nearing the end of the baby boomer era (1946 to 1965), people married at a young age and had large families. This led to a bustling workforce. Today, the changing social conditions may contribute

to smaller family sizes. Innisfree's population decline is influenced by societal changes, employment opportunities and available services.

2.3 Residential Building Trends

The 2016 federal census identified 95 private dwellings in the Village, with single detached being the predominant housing form representing 84% of the existing structures. Other attached dwellings (row house and single attached house), were defined as the second most common housing type accounting for 10.5% of existing structures. Moveable dwellings, defined as mobile homes made up the smallest portion of housing stock at approximately 5.5%.

The federal census indicates 85 dwellings were constructed prior to 1980. In the 20-year period between 1980 and 2000, 10 dwellings were constructed. Census data from 2016 indicates the available housing stock has not changed, with 95 private households reported. This information demonstrates that approximately 89.5% of the current housing stock in the Village is at least 36 years of age and constructed before 1980.

The demand for residential development is not expected to change over the next 30 years. Figures in Section 2.5 explain the development and growth projections.

2.4 Development Influences

Map 2 (see appendix) identifies significant features that influence the future growth pattern of the Village. The features represent urban development constraints and opportunities. The ability to attract commercial and industrial development is evident based on the Village's proximity to transportation networks, specifically rail and highways.

Map 2 identifies the significant natural constraints within the community, these being naturally occurring features. There are standing water bodies within the boundary that supports the agricultural activities, natural habitats, wetlands and recreational pursuits.

Map 2 identifies the significant human constraints within the community, mainly oil and gas activity. There is multiple oil and gas wells surrounding the Village, many of which are active. Oil and gas activity may restrict the type of development that can occur as a result of regulated or imposed setbacks. Remediation of contaminated lands (privately owned) is required to support future land development within the existing boundary.

The surrounding land is primarily used for agricultural purposes and is protected by the County of Minburn which may limit the Village's ability to expand beyond its existing borders.

2.5 Future Trends and Influences

The Village of Innisfree is positioned close to the Highway 16 corridor and is central to major urban centres. With its central location to large urban centre such as Edmonton, Lloydminster, Vermillion and Vegreville, there is ample opportunity for economic growth and development. There is a variety of recreation activities, access to transportation and basic business services. The Village is connected to a regional water line and provides exceptional water quality and quantity to its citizens. The local school is a key asset that continues to attract young families. Healthcare facilities may be accessed in neighboring communities with ease due to the strong transportation network. Regional collaboration is prominent and may influence future growth.

The inclusiveness and affordability of the community continues to attract retirees and young families from large urban centres. In addition, the Village maintains it heritage. This deeply rooted community has many third-generation families residing within.

Innisfree provides a quality of life unique to those that choose to leave the complexities of large urban centres.

Long-term growth in Innisfree will be dependent on several factors:

- The level of services and amenities contributing to a high quality of life available in the community,
- Maintaining and expanding collaborative relations with adjacent municipalities and organizations (e.g. school boards, Alberta HUB, County of Minburn) to ensure affordable, quality services are provided to residents within the region,
- Actively pursue and participate in regional initiatives to develop strong relations with neighboring municipalities,
- Economic and employment opportunities within the region,
- Access to continuing education and healthcare,
- The availability of affordable housing relative to other opportunities in the region, and
- People's preference for small town living in a rural setting.

Projected Population Growth

Population growth is expected to remain consistent throughout the planning period as shown in Figure 3. Figure 4 reflects the anticipated dwelling units required for the population projections based on a 2.1 persons household.




The Village is expected to maintain a population of approximately 200 people by 2050 if the growth rate is maintained. It is important to note that influencing factors could change the projections in Figures 3 and 4 overtime.

3.0 Vision Statement

The vision for the community was developed in mid-2018 and will guide the remaining sections of the MDP.

"Innisfree is a safe and healthy place to establish roots, promotes sustainable development and active lifestyles."

3.1 Future Land Use Concept

Map 1, Land Use Concept (see appendix) identifies the preferred long-range growth and land use pattern as envisioned by the Village. This includes the type and location of different land uses, potential future growth areas outside the Village's boundaries, and the general location of major roads. The land use concept may be further defined through the preparation and adoption of statutory and non-statutory plans for smaller areas of the Village.

The potential growth areas defined outside the Village's boundaries (see Map 1) within the County of Minburn's jurisdiction are aspirational and are not binding. Further consideration for growth areas beyond the Village's corporate limits shall be provided in an Inter-municipal Development Plan and other joint statutory documents.

The Land Use Bylaw shall be utilized to implement the MDP policies through the designation of land use districts and the application of development standards for each district. The land use designations and the objectives for each are defined below:

- Residential Districts reflects existing areas of residential development, land subdivided for residential development, and land intended for future residential growth.
- <u>Commercial Districts</u> reflects areas of existing commercial development and future areas for commercial development.
- <u>Institutional District</u> reflects existing and future areas for institutional development.
- Open Space reflects areas to be kept in a natural state and public and private recreational areas.

4.0 Growth Management

Goal and Objectives

Achieve sustainable urban development that aligns with the physical settings and characteristics of the Village.

- Fiscal responsibility sustainable growth.
- Urban growth shall be balanced to ensure high quality development through best managed practices.
- Administer policy and apply development standards in a consistent manner.
- Focus on proper planning practices through general land use controls.
- Open to new sustainable ideas that will improve the aesthetics of the Village.

Policies

- 1. The Village shall support a variety of housing options that contribute to economic growth initiatives as defined in Section 5.0.
- 2. The Village shall ensure growth is managed to limit urban sprawl whenever possible to protect land and resources for current and future generations.
- 3. The Village shall focus on infill residential and non-residential development whenever possible to maximize the use of existing infrastructure and assets.
- 4. The Village may consider land re-designation to accommodate unexpected or unique developments. As part of this process, the Village may require an area structure plan. The area structure plan shall be prepared to the satisfaction of the municipality and shall include all requirements specified in the *Municipal Government Act*.
- 5. Any additional studies, statutory plans, testing or approvals that may be required to determine the suitability of the subject lands for development may also be required and shall be the responsibility of the developer.
- 6. Overtime, the Village shall identify future growth needs and plan for annexations with the County of Minburn. Plans for annexation may be referred to in the Inter-municipal Collaboration Framework agreement.
- 7. The Village shall maintain a capital infrastructure plan. Any major public expenditure that is intended to improve the capacity of the Village shall be consistent with the community's capital and spending priorities.
- 8. The Village shall continue to apply for funding through regional and government agencies to support the community's growth objectives.
- 9. The Village shall endeavor to maintain strong local and regional partnership to support development/growth objectives that directly and indirectly benefit the community and region.

5.0 Economic Development

Goal and Objectives

Economic development and diversity are integral to the future growth and sustainability of the Village. Thus, the Village aims to expand the local economy to improve the tax base to ensure a variety of local employment opportunities and to enhance the quality of life for its residents.

- Endeavour to maintain or decrease the residential and non-residential mill rate to improve affordability and to attract economic development.
- Endeavour to increase the non-residential assessment base by 10 percent by 2029.
- Champion and advocate for local employment opportunities.
- Develop and maintain strong relations with the County of Minburn and regional organizations such as Alberta HUB to support strong economic ties that would be beneficial to the Village and region.

Policies

- 1. The Village shall support diversification of the local economy through the expansion of commercial and industrial activities. Diversification and expansion shall compliment the surrounding built and natural environments.
- 2. The Village shall support economic development from within the community through home-based businesses or home-occupations in residential areas whenever possible to enhance the local economy.
- 3. The Village supports, in principle, entrepreneurial ventures that contribute to the growth and expansion of the local economy.
- 4. The Village supports, in principle, private economic development initiatives.
- 5. The Village supports, in principle, joint (public and private) economic development initiatives.
- 6. The Village supports, whenever possible regional economic development initiatives.
- 7. The Village should consider the preparation of an economic development strategy that focuses on transportation and logistics corridors to drive local investment and growth opportunities.
- 8. The Village should consider the development of a marketing strategy that brings awareness to community's develop-ability and affordable living options.
- 9. The Village shall maintain an active online business directory. The Village should consider the development of a needs assessment that defines what business or industries are needed in the community. Upon completion, the needs assessment should be promoted to attract/showcase economic opportunities.

10. The Village shall refer economic expansion opportunities (within the municipality's corporate limits) to the County of Minburn for comment.

6.0 Urban Form, Housing and Neighbourhood Design

Goal and Objectives

The Village of Innisfree is a livable community that is barrier free and accessible to all.

- Affordable living.
- Reduce or maintain existing residential and non-residential mill rates.
- Increase the local tax base.
- Provide services and amenities that support healthy living.
- A safe community.
- Variety of housing opportunities to meet the needs of individual lifecycles.
- To minimize potential conflict between residential and non-residential land uses.

Policies

- 1. Urban development shall be of a high-quality design to reflect and complement existing development in the vicinity.
- 2. All urban development should complement the vision of the Village and aim to improve the economics and/or quality of life for those residing and visiting the community.
- 3. The density, scale, massing, floor area ratio, height, siting, setbacks and lot coverage of development shall be compatible with the existing development pattern in the surrounding area.
- 4. The Village shall direct residential development to areas identified in the Land Use Concept Map 1.
- 5. The Village shall ensure a broad mix of housing opportunities to include low, medium and high densities within the residential districts.
- 6. The Village shall support infill residential developments.
- 7. Residential districts shall be buffered from non-residential districts.

7.0 Commercial

Goal and Objectives

An active and attractive commercial area that supports local, regional, and international needs.

- Support existing businesses.
- Welcome and inclusive community for new commercial businesses.
- Promote a variety of employment opportunities.
- Diversify the local tax base seeking long-term sustainability.
- Maintain an inventory of commercially designated lands for sale or development.
- Focus on growth plans that take advantage of the transportation corridors to attract commercial development.
- To minimize potential conflict between commercial and non-commercial land uses.

Policies

- 1. The Village shall encourage the location of commercial development within the area identified in the Land Use Concept map (see appendix). The detailed form of commercial development shall be determined through area structure plans and area redevelopment plans where applicable, and Land Use Bylaw designations.
- 2. The Village shall encourage infill commercial development.
- 3. The Village shall encourage commercial development on highway 16 and ultimately seek to expand commercial development to light industrial development.
- 4. The Village shall work closely with Alberta Transportation to maintain proper access to the community from highway 16 and secondary highway 870.
- 5. The Village shall encourage railway companies and land developers, in co-operation with the County of Minburn and Alberta Transportation where applicable, to make provisions for convenient and safe rail crossings to facilitate vehicular and pedestrian movement.
- 6. The Village may require that a traffic impact assessment (TIA) be prepared in accordance with the Village's and/or Alberta Transportation requirements in support of an application for subdivision, development or redistricting, or as part of a conceptual scheme or area structure plan accompanying such an application. The Developer shall bear the responsibility and the costs of preparing the TIA as well as any undertakings and improvements specified in the TIA.
- 7. The Village shall assist where applicable with any applications to Alberta Transportation for commercial highway access points in future expansion areas.
- 8. Commercial development exteriors shall be of a high-quality design to reflect and complement existing development in the vicinity.

- 9. The Village encourages home based business within the residentially designated areas.
- 10. The Village shall strive for the redevelopment of the Central Business District along Railway Avenue, 50^{th} Avenue, and 52^{nd} Street.
- 11. The Village shall promote and encourage sustainable commercial building practices.

8.0 Industrial

Goal and Objectives

An active industrial area that provides employment opportunities to support local, regional, and international needs.

- Support existing businesses.
- Welcome and inclusive community for new industrial businesses.
- Promote a variety of employment opportunities.
- Diversify the local tax base seeking long-term sustainability.
- Maintain an inventory of industrial designated lands for sale or development.
- Focus on growth plans that take advantage of the transportation corridors to attract industrial development.
- To minimize potential conflicts between industrial and non-industrial land uses.

- 1. The Village shall encourage the location of industrial development within the area identified in the Land Use Concept map (see appendix). The detailed form of industrial development shall be determined through area structure plans and area redevelopment plans where applicable, and Land Use Bylaw designations.
- 2. The Village shall encourage industrial development along the highway 16 corridor.
- 3. The Village shall encourage industrial development by maintaining a large land base for industry. The Village shall annex land from the County of Minburn east and west along highway 16 to expand industrial use and development.
- 4. The Village shall work closely with industrial developers to ensure suitable lands are acquired for industry needs while taking into consideration the natural and built environment.
- 5. Proper environmental practices shall be required for all industrial developments.
- 6. The Village shall promote and encourage sustainable industrial building practices.
- 7. The Village may require an independent Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) to be completed before permitting an industrial use that may potentially cause environmental risks or public health problems.
- 8. The Village shall strongly consider the impact of land use conflicts related to noise, vibration, smoke, dust, odor or potential environmental contaminants. There shall be proper separation and buffer between all industrial and residential areas.
- 9. The Village shall encourage railway companies and land developers, in co-operation with the County of Minburn and Alberta Transportation where applicable, to make

- provisions for convenient and safe rail crossings to facilitate vehicular and pedestrian movement.
- 10. The Village may require that a traffic impact assessment (TIA) be prepared in accordance with the Village's and/or Alberta Transportation requirements in support of an application for subdivision, development or redistricting, or as part of a conceptual scheme or area structure plan accompanying such an application. The Developer shall bear the responsibility and the costs of preparing the TIA as well as any undertakings and improvements specified in the TIA.

9.0 Transportation

Goal and Objectives

The Village of Innisfree is widely accessible with an extensive transportation network that contributes to the safety and flow of people, business, and industry.

- A well-maintained road, rail and transportation network.
- To ensure transportation infrastructure is developed, maintained and safe for vehicular and pedestrian traffic.
- To ensure the future land use and development is compatible with existing and planned transportation network expansion.

- 1. The Village shall ensure all development provides for the safe flow (access and egress) of traffic from adjacent roadways without disruption to the transportation network.
- 2. The Village shall ensure transportation infrastructure is planned and constructed in a cost-effective manner and shall continue to incorporate roadway improvements in the capital plan where applicable.
- 3. The Village shall coordinate with Alberta Transportation for transportation upgrades.
- 4. The Village shall collaborate with regional partners to enhance transportation networks.
- 5. The Village shall clearly mark all truck routes to prevent interruption within residential districts.
- 6. The Village shall support infill development to best utilize existing infrastructure.
- 7. The Village shall consult with CN Rail to ensure proper rail safety and rail maintenance occurs.
- 8. Property for road rights-of-way will be acquired through dedication or an agreement for purchase at the time of development or redevelopment of a property through building setbacks or subdivision design.
- 9. The Village may establish a bylaw for off-site levies in accordance with the *Municipal Government Act*.
- 10. The Village should adopt standards and specifications for future road developments to include, road widths, road base, drainage, curb, gutter, and sidewalks.

10.0 Heritage Preservation

Goals and Objective

Well preserved heritage sites that assist with the promotion and development of the Village.

- Partner with local community groups and organizations to rehabilitate and maintain the Village's heritage sites.
- Support the development and expansion of cultural assets within the Village.
- Support and encourage opportunities for the rehabilitation of historical building on Main Street.
- Support and encourage belonging and the community's sense of identity.

- 1. The Village shall encourage owners and developers to rehabilitate cultural buildings where there is significant value and benefit.
- 2. The Village shall protect existing heritage sites from incompatible developments.
- 3. The Village shall assist wherever possible the promotion of cultural assets such as the museum.
- 4. Cultural organizations shall be encouraged to work with regional, provincial and international tourism associations to promote and market the Village's historical assets.
- 5. The Village shall support cultural diversity and assist with land mark designations where applicable.
- 6. The Village shall support a local and regional community culture of "togetherness".

11.0 Parks, Recreation and Culture

Goals and Objectives

A connected community that is supported by abundant open/green spaces, recreation, and cultural opportunities for all ages to promote healthy living.

- Promote healthy and sustainable living.
- Effective use of reserve lands.
- Natural space for current and future generations to enjoy.
- Environmentally sustainable operating practices.
- An accessible community that offers a variety of barrier free activities.

- 1. The Village shall provide built and natural settings for recreation and culture facilities, parks and green spaces, open areas and trails to meet the needs of the community and to remain competitive in the urban landscape.
- 2. The Village shall incorporate barrier free developments within all parks, recreation and cultural sites to ensure proper access for uses.
- 3. The Village shall adopt greening initiatives (e.g. tree and flower planting) that contribute to local beautification.
- 4. The Village should continue to explore funding opportunities for the provision of parks, recreation and cultural facilities in the community. Funding opportunities may be through regional partnerships, government agencies, not-for-profit organizations, foundations and local community groups.
- 5. The Village shall complete a needs assessment prior to the expansion or redevelopment of any park, recreation or cultural facility.
- 6. The Village shall integrate sustainable building practices where applicable to reduce the overhead/operating costs within all recreation and cultural facilities.
- 7. The Village shall promote and market Innisfree Recreation Park, the Recreation Centre, Ice Arena/Agri plex, Curling Centre and Equestrian Riding Arena.
- 8. The Village shall preserve Innisfree Recreation Park.
- 9. The Village shall encourage the recognition of donations through signage or place naming throughout the community for parks, recreation and cultural facilities.
- 10. The Village shall work with public and private developers to coordinate activities to enhance parks and open spaces.
- 11. The Village supports the preservation of natural areas and natural vegetation in open spaces. A variety of native trees and vegetation shall be encouraged to minimize maintenance and water use.

- 12. The Village encourages the planting of shelterbelts and windbreaks on public and private lands.
- 13. The Village supports pedestrian and bicycle accessibility. Sidewalks shall be constructed and marked to promote barrier free usage where applicable.
- 14. The Village shall consult with community stakeholders when developing any type of trail network.
- 15. Upon subdivision, the subdivision authority shall require the provision of up to 10 percent of the land to be subdivided as Municipal Reserve in accordance with the provisions of the *Municipal Government Act*. Municipal Reserves parcels shall be located to allow for convenient access by the public and shall not consist of ecologically sensitive areas.
- 16. The Village shall consider the use of Municipal Reserve lands for recreation. New residential subdivisions shall include Municipal Reserve lands for the purpose of integrating walking trails and access to recreational amenities in the community.
- 17. Municipal and Environmental Reserves may be used for active and passive recreation, the development of continuous pedestrian linkages or for natural drainage courses, storm water retention or other similar uses. The Village may, at its discretion, credit a portion of lands dedicated as public utility lots (PULs) towards overall reserve dedication if the Village determines that the subject PUL lands have recreational value.
- 18. Municipal Reserve parcels may be used to provide green spaces, buffers, school sites, parks and recreation facilities, and linear parks and pathways.
- 19. When dedication of Municipal Reserve is required for subdivision, the Village may accept cash-in-lieu of dedication unless there is an identified need for recreational land in the vicinity of the development.

12.0 Environment

Goal and Objectives

To take a balanced approach to ensure the Village effectively manages environmental conservation and economic development.

- To restrict development on land that is environmentally sensitive and/or subject to development risks.
- To lead by example through environmental management best practices and to extend the responsibility of best practices to property owners and developers.
- To acknowledge and conserve the natural environment of the Village for current and future generations.

- 1. The Village shall encourage those with agricultural holdings to protect the natural and economic value of their soils by minimizing activities that cause soil degradation or loss.
- 2. The Village may implement a water conservation plan to reduce the quantity of water consumed within the community.
- 3. The Village may require that subdivision and development proposals involving hazard land provide a Phase 1 Environmental Site Assessment in accordance with the Canadian Standards Association Z768-01 and/or a geotechnical assessment prepared by a qualified professional engineer. Directives from the studies to mitigate potential hazards may be directed to the applicant.
- 4. Prior to acquiring lands, the Village shall obtain a Phase 1 Environmental Site Assessment in accordance with the Canadian Standards Association Z768-01 and/or a geotechnical assessment prepared by a qualified professional engineer to ensure the integrity of the lands.
- 5. If land or property is suspect of contamination, the Village shall require documentation to confirm that the site has been cleared of contamination prior to any development.
- 6. The Village shall protect water sources by minimizing potential negative impacts through sound land use planning practices.
- 7. The Village shall encourage sustainable development practices to protect the environment (e.g. alternate energy sources, water recirculation systems, etc.).
- 8. The Village shall ensure storm water drainage is properly integrated into all new developments.
- 9. The Village shall endeavor to protect and conserve natural areas and integrate the areas into open spaces for citizens to enjoy.
- 10. Upon subdivision, the subdivision authority may require that undevelopable lands are dedicated as Environmental Reserve parcels or Environmental Reserve easements in accordance with the provisions of the *Municipal Government Act*.

13.0 Community and Protective Services

Goal and Objectives

The Village of Innisfree prioritizes actions to ensure it is a safe community.

- Protect the residents from criminal and unlawful activities.
- Protect the residents of Innisfree in emergent situations.
- Cooperate with adjacent municipalities to ensure public safety is managed effectively through emergency services.

- 1. Public safety requirements shall guide all developments.
- 2. The Village shall ensure its Emergency Management Plan is implemented and up-todate to protect the safety of its residents.
- 3. The Village shall participate in regional emergency management preparedness training.
- 4. The Village shall ensure protective services are available locally or regionally in accordance with the *Municipal Government Act*.
- 5. The Village shall consider *Crime Prevention through Environmental Design* principles when reviewing development applications and in the layout and implementation of public areas, gathering spaces, and green spaces.

14.0 Municipal Infrastructure

Goal and Objectives

To attract and retain citizens, business, industry and tourism, the Village will provide core services with access to safe, reliable utility and infrastructure services. The Village will proactively plan for utility service and infrastructure maintenance to support future urban development.

- Provide municipal services that contribute to quality living in the Village.
- Fiscal responsibility plan for the maintenance, replacement and upgrading of public utilities.
- Promote best practices to maintain or reduce the cost of providing municipal services to the citizens of Innisfree.

- 1. The Village shall maintain a capital infrastructure replacement plan that prioritizes municipal infrastructure priorities in alignment with its capital plan.
- 2. The Village should continue to apply for funding to assist with municipal infrastructure upgrades through government agencies.
- 3. The Village should endeavor to maintain a Geographic Information System (GIS) to record and track all municipal infrastructure.
- 4. The Village should endeavour to maintain a current asset management plan.
- 5. Development and services should occur in a manner that minimizes the financial burden and risk for citizens and property owners of Innisfree while maintaining the community's fiscal health.
- 6. The Village shall ensure protective services are provided to the residents of Innisfree in a cost effective and efficient manner.
- 7. The Village shall ensure the citizens of Innisfree receive fair and equitable common services such as, snow removal, infrastructure maintenance, and garbage pick-up/amenities.
- 8. The Village shall ensure the citizens of Innisfree have access to social programming whenever possible to improve their quality of life.
- 9. The Village may transition to a cost-recovery financial system for recreation and culture services to reduce the general tax base for users.
- 10. The Village shall adopt sustainable practices, whenever possible to reduce the operating cost of municipal facilities, services and infrastructure.
- 11. The Village supports the development, whenever possible, of partnerships with the County of Minburn and adjacent municipalities for the provision of municipal services.

15.0 Inter-municipal Cooperation

Goal and Objective

Long-term viability is influenced by the Village's efforts for inter-municipal collaboration and cooperation.

- Cooperative planning with the County of Minburn.
- Maintain strong relationships with adjacent municipalities and organizations such as Alberta HUB.

- 1. The Village shall prepare an Inter-municipal Collaboration Framework with the County of Minburn as defined in the *Municipal Government Act*.
- 2. The Village shall ensure open/transparent communication with adjacent municipalities and stakeholders when considering land use and development decisions.
- 3. The Village shall cooperate in joint planning, development and operating frameworks with adjacent municipalities that addresses effective and cost-efficient coordination of land uses, future growth areas, transportation systems, municipal infrastructure and community services through the policies.
- 4. The Village shall discourage any development that has a negative impact on adjacent municipalities. The Village shall refer to the County of Minburn for comment, prior to a decision all:
 - a. Proposed statutory plans and plan amendments,
 - b. Applications for land use bylaw amendments that may impact the County,
 - c. General planning studies and other major development proposals located adjacent to the Village boundary.
- 5. The Village shall refer to the Inter-municipal Development Plan or Inter-municipal Collaboration Framework for annexations.

16.0 Implementation

Goal and Objectives

To promote the implementation of the MDP.


- To implement the MDP through other statutory and non-statutory plans and to ensure consistency between the plans.
- To foster awareness of land use planning policies and participation in planning processes by stakeholders and the general public.
- To provide for periodic review of the MDP to monitor the efforts to achieve the MDP's goals.

- 1. The Village, landowner or developer may initiate an amendment to this Plan. The Village shall require the submission of such background information to support the request for a bylaw amendment. Amendment of the MDP shall follow the appropriate procedures as outlined in the *Municipal Government Act*. The Village may charge a fee to process an amendment to this plan.
- 2. All statutory plans adopted by the Village shall be consistent with one another.
- 3. The Village may require an area structure plan when considering a subdivision application for larger parcels of land.
- 4. The Village shall complete a formal review of the Plan every five-years.
- 5. The Village shall complete an informal review of the Plan every three-years to measure the implementation of its policies.


Future Land Use Concept Map



Purpose(s):

1. To review and consider a small wage increase for the Administrative Assistant position. Furthermore, Council to review and consider having the Administrative Assistant position start on June 17, 2019 instead of July 1, 2019.

Background:

Canada Summer Jobs application has been approved for the positions of Administrative Assistant, Public Works Assistant and Recreation Park Assistant. The Village of Innisfree has been approved for \$6,300.00 (\$2100/role) at an hourly rate of \$15.00/hr. Applicants are to be starting on July 1, 2019.

We have received numerous applications for all roles; however, 1 applicant has been selected for the role of Administration Assistant. Other roles are yet to be determined. The applicant chosen for the Administrative Assistant role has asked to start as early as June 17, 2019 instead of July 1, 2019.

With the amount of responsibility within Administrative Assistant Role, as well as the amount of experience the applicant has, I feel it is necessary to provide a small wage increase. The current wage approved by Canada Summer Jobs is \$15/hour and I would like Council to consider an hourly rate of \$17/hour.

Approved by CSJ: \$15/hour x 280hrs = \$4,200 - CSJ Portion = **\$2100.00 (Village portion)**

Proposed: \$17/hour x 350hrs = \$5950 - \$2100.00 (CSJ portion) = **\$3850.00 (Village portion)**


7L65 LINE REBUILD PROJECT — TYPICAL STRUCTURE UPDATE

In the initial Project Newsletter sent in September 2017, we indicated that the typical structure for the rebuilt transmission line would be a single circuit 'Davit Arm.' Upon further technical review of the Project, ATCO is changing the typical structure to a slightly different design.

If approved, the new typical structure for the project will be a 'Wishbone' design, consisting of a single wood pole. The notable difference between the 'Davit Arm' and 'Wishbone' designs is the hardware connecting the wires to the pole. The size of pole and overall dimensions remain similar to the previously proposed 'Davit Arm' design. The distance between structures will range from 120 m - 175 m.

The 'Wishbone' design is common to some other transmission lines in the Project area. Non-typical structures with wider bases and/ or guy wires and anchors may be required where the line ends or bends, at corners and to go over and around obstacles. In all cases, minimum clearance will meet or exceed the requirements of provincial safety regulations.



7L65 LINE REBUILD PROJECT

Routing Update

In September 2017, ATCO Electric Ltd. (ATCO) distributed project information about the 7L65 Line Rebuild Project to landholders in the vicinity of the planned transmission line and invited feedback on our preliminary routes. We also held a series of open houses in October for people to learn more about the project.

Since then, we have been meeting individually with landholders in the vicinity of the routes under consideration. To date, we have had over 400 conversations with landholders about the project. We would like to thank everyone who provided their feedback.

The input we received during the first round of consultation has been compiled and examined. This input has been used in combination with other available information to refine the route options and reduce the overall impact of the transmission line. An updated Reference Map showing the selected routes is enclosed.

You continue to have the opportunity to provide your input on the project. Please contact us at **1 855 420 5775** to share your thoughts.

If you received this package in the mail, updated Route Mosaic Maps are enclosed showing the selected route options in relation to your property. Rejected options — routes no longer considered — are also shown. Project Details

ATCO is proposing to rebuild the existing 7L65 transmission line to allow the facility to operate at full thermal capacity. The proposed new 144-kilovolt (kV) transmission line will be located between the Vegreville and the Vermilion substations. The existing 7L65 line will be removed once the rebuilt line is operating but will remain in operation until that time.

Next Steps

We are now in the process of providing additional details about the right-of-way locations and potential construction activities to those directly affected by the selected route options. In the weeks ahead, we will be contacting these parties, and follow-up consultations will be conducted in an effort to reduce potential impacts.

Route refinements at this stage will typically involve localized adjustments to the line location in response to site-specific concerns and constraints.

If you are not in the direct vicinity of the selected routes, you will not be contacted during our second round of personal consultations. Please check the enclosed maps to verify the location of your property in relation to the selected routes.

Your Input

Route Selection

The selected routes were chosen based on consultation feedback and combined with other available information to refine the route options in an effort to reduce potential impacts. In some locations, preliminary route options were dropped from further consideration. In other locations, new options were developed as a result of your feedback.

Consultation feedback is not the only factor that must be considered during the route selection process. We must also consider a range of important factors, including proximity to residences,

environmentally sensitive areas, wetlands, existing infrastructure (such as other transmission lines, roads, well sites and pipelines), planned developments, agricultural operations, visual factors and construction requirements. Whenever possible, consideration is given to routing new transmission lines along existing linear features, such as quarter section lines, roads, and other powerlines.

The consultation process for this project is ongoing. That means we have yet to determine the preferred route for the transmission line, and in some areas we may decide to propose both preferred and alternative route options. Although multiple route options may be proposed, only one route will be built.

THE PROCESS

We begin sharing information about the project to determine the best options.

We gather your input. Based on this input and other factors, route option(s) are selected. ATCO submits an application to the AUC to build the proposed facility.

The AUC reviews the application by way of a public process.

If approved, construction of the new facility begins.

Access Trails and Temporary Workspace


Access trails may be required in areas where terrain conditions or the presence of wetlands make driving along the right-of-way impractical. In each location, access trails will be either temporary or permanent, and will be approximately 7 metres (m) wide.

In addition, a minimum of 3 m of temporary workspace is required alongside the right-of-way to accommodate the movement of equipment during construction. At corners or locations where the line bends, additional areas may be required to string the transmission line and accommodate the movement of equipment. These areas will vary in size up to 18 m wide and extend as much as 100 m from the corner structure.


For salvage of the existing transmission line, a minimum of 8 m of temporary workspace is required along both sides of the existing transmission line to provide appropriate space for the safe removal of wires and structures.

If you own or occupy land in the vicinity of these access trails and temporary workspaces then your package will also contain one or more detailed Facility Detail Maps.

Arrangements for access trails and temporary workspace will be discussed and negotiated with landowners individually. Actual dimensions of these features may vary with final plans.

The Right-of-Way

The term right-of-way refers to the area a transmission line uses including areas on either side of the line. Rights-of-way must have a minimum width to ensure safety and ongoing access for maintenance. For safety reasons, some general restrictions on the use of the land in the direct vicinity of the transmission line may apply. These include setbacks for development. The typical right-of-way for this project is 18 m (9 m when following a road).

Once a proposed route has been submitted to the AUC, ATCO begins obtaining agreements with landholders to acquire the right-of-way.

Once the transmission line is constructed, landholders may continue to use the right-of-way, subject to the terms of agreements made between the landholder and ATCO.

Decommission and Salvage

Once the new line is constructed, the existing 7L65 line is no longer needed. The existing structures and conductor wires will be removed and the right-of-way areas reclaimed.

Construction of this project is planned to occur in up to three phases, separated into regional sections of line. The exact timing and location of each phase has yet to be determined, as is the timing of decommissioning and salvage of the existing 7L65 line. Details regarding the construction of this project will be shared with directly affected landholders as plans are finalized.

The Alberta Electric System Operator (AESO) is an independent, not-for-profit organization responsible for the safe, reliable and economic planning and operation of the provincial transmission grid. The AESO acts in the interests of all Albertans to determine what electrical infrastructure is needed.

As per the AESO's long-term plan, 7L65 is required to continue operating indefinitely at its full capacity. However, 7L65 is currently operating lower than its full capacity due to the age and condition of the line.

7L65 is at the end of its operating life, as well the electrical system in the area is experiencing localized load growth. Therefore, ATCO is planning a complete replacement of the line to ensure suitable operability into the future.

(hereinafter called the "Company")

(Landowner and Company collectively the "parties" and either one a "party")

WHEREAS the Landowner is the registered owner, or is entitled to become the registered owner, of an estate in fee simple, subject to such encumbrances, liens and interests, if any, as may be noted upon the existing Certificate of Title in all that certain parcel of land in the Province of Alberta, being:

WHICH LIES TO THE NORTH OF THE NORTH SHORE OF BIRCH LAKE

CONTAINING 25.1 HECTARES (62 ACRES) MORE OR LESS
EXCEPTING THEREOUT:

A) ALL THAT PORTION NOT COVERED BY THE SAID LAKE, AND DESCRIBED AS FOLLOWS: COMMENCING AT A POINT ON THE EAST BOUNDARY OF THE SAID QUARTER SECTION 1970 FEET SOUTHERLY FROM THE NORTH EAST CORNER THEREOF; THENCE NORTHERLY ALONG THE SAID EAST BOUNDARY 970 FEET; THENCE WESTERLY AND PARALLEL TO THE NORTH BOUNDARY OF THE SAID QUARTER SECTION 1120 FEET; THENCE SOUTHERLY AND PARALLEL TO THE SAID EAST BOUNDARY 375 FEET; THENCE SOUTH EASTERLY IN A STAIGHT LINE TO THE POINT OF COMMENCEMENT, CONTAINING 17.30 ACRES MORE OR LESS B) 7.49 ACRES MORE OR LESS FOR WAYSIDE CAMPSITE, AS SHOWN ON ROAD PLAN 3378LZ C) 7.98 ACRES MORE OR LESS FOR ROAD, 0.78 OF AN ACRE MORE OR LESS FOR CONNECTING ROAD AND 0.46 OF AN ACRE MORE OR LESS FOR EXTRA ROAD, AS SHOWN ON ROAD PLAN 6060RS

EXCEPTING THEREOUT ALL MINES AND MINERALS

(hereinafter called the "Lands");

AND WHEREAS the Company wishes to construct, operate and maintain a Transmission Line in order to transmit electric energy;

NOW THEREFORE in consideration of the sum of -----ONE----- (\$1.00) DOLLAR (the receipt and sufficiency of which is hereby acknowledged), paid to the Landowner by the Company, and in consideration of the covenants contained in this Agreement, THE LANDOWNER DOES HEREBY GRANT, CONVEY, TRANSFER, AND SET OVER to and unto the Company, its successors, assigns, servants, agents, and contractors a Right-of-Way and a Vegetation Control Easement:

- (i) within, across, upon, under, over and through the Lands for the purposes of surveying, erecting, installing, constructing, operating, using, maintaining, inspecting, patrolling, removing, replacing, reconstructing, altering and repairing a Transmission Line, and for any other purpose preparatory or incidental thereto, and
- (ii) to use the Lands to gain access and egress to and from the Right-of-Way and Vegetation Control Easement by persons and equipment, and to go outside the limits of the Right-of-Way and Vegetation Control Easement with all necessary persons and equipment in emergency situations, and
- (iii) over the portion of the Lands identified as the Vegetation Control Easement to remove or Trim any trees and other vegetation within the Vegetation Control Easement which, in the opinion of the Company, may constitute a hazard to the Transmission Line, and from time to time, provide prior notice to the Landowner and go on the Lands located outside the limits of the Right-of-Way and Vegetation Control Easement to Trim trees on such Lands that the Company considers a hazard to the Transmission Line.

The rights granted in this Agreement are granted on the following terms and conditions and shall continue for so long as the Company may desire to exercise such rights:

1. **DEFINITIONS**

In this Agreement the expressions set out below shall have the following meanings:

- (a) "Annual Compensation" means the annual payment made by the Company to compensate the Landowner for:
 - (i) the loss of use by the Landowner of all or part of the Right-of-Way;
 - (ii) the nuisance, inconvenience, noise, weed control and interference that might arise or be caused to the agricultural operations of the Landowner; and
 - (iii) the adverse effect of the Right-of-Way on the remaining Lands.
- (b) "Cultivated Lands" means that portion of the Lands, excluding the Head Lands, which are cultivated or worked in any way by farm machinery on an annual basis for the production of crops including cereal and oilseed crops, hay crops and summer fallow.
- (c) "Energization" means the commencement of the transmission of electrical energy in bulk.
- (d) "Head Lands" means, where applicable, the area of the Lands on the edge of the Cultivated Lands.
- (e) "Right-of-Way" means the portion of the Lands in the approximate location as shown on the sketch plan attached as Schedule "A" to be further delineated by a plan of survey.
- (f) "Structure" means any tower, single or multiple poles or other supports together with all attachments which may be placed on the Right-of-Way by the Company for the purpose of supporting electric energy conductors, other wires and equipment.
- (g) "Transmission Line" means a single series of Structures located on the Right-of-Way and strung with one or more conductors or other wires, together with all substations, operational and control devices, and all property of any kind used for the purpose of or in connection with, or incidental to, the operation of a Transmission Line, including without limitation related equipment as may be deemed necessary by the Company, whereby electric energy is transmitted in bulk.

- (h) "Trim" means any method of reducing the size of trees or other vegetation including the application of herbicides, but does not mean the right to use soil sterilants which shall only be used with the specific consent of the Landowner and "Trimming" and "Trimmed" shall have a corresponding meaning.
- (i) "Uncultivated Lands" means the portion of the Lands that are not Cultivated Lands or Head Lands.
- (j) "Vegetation Control Easement" has the meaning given to it in Clause 6 hereof.

2. FILING PLAN OF SURVEY

The Company agrees that on or before two years from the Energization of the Transmission Line it shall register at the appropriate Land Titles Office a plan of survey limiting the Right-of-Way to a strip war idole () metres in width across the Lands in the approximate location as shown on the sketch plan attached hereto as **Schedule "A"**, initialed by the Landowner and delivered to the Landowner at the time of signing this Agreement. Immediately upon registration of the plan of survey, the Company shall forward to the Landowner the plan of survey or an extract from the plan of survey showing the location of the Right of Way on the Lands.

3. RESTRICTION OF RIGHT-OF-WAY BY PARTIAL WITHDRAWAL AND DISCHARGE

Upon registration of the plan of survey at the appropriate Land Titles Office, the Company shall, if applicable, register partial discharge documents restricting this Agreement and the rights herein granted in subparagraph (i) of the granting provision of this Agreement to the Right-of-Way delimited by the plan of survey; PROVIDED, HOWEVER, that notwithstanding the registration of the partial discharge documents the Company shall continue to be entitled to the rights set out in subparagraphs (ii) and (iii) of the granting provisions of this Agreement.

4. CONSULTATION WITH THE LANDOWNER ON LOCATION OF STRUCTURES

The Company agrees that prior to commencement of actual construction of the Transmission Line, it shall, upon the request of the Landowner, consult with the Landowner with respect to the location of the Structures within the Right-of-Way, provided that the location of the Structures shall be in the Company's sole discretion.

5. COMPENSATION FOR GRANT OF RIGHT-OF-WAY

Prior to commencing actual construction of the Transmission Line on the Lands, the Company shall pay the Landowner:

a)	pursuant to Section 19(1) of the Surface Rights Act, as amended, the entry fee for

6. PAYMENT OF COMPENSATION FOR TRIMMING AND REMOVAL OF VEGETATION

7. BASIS OF ANNUAL COMPENSATION FOR STRUCTURES

Within a reasonable time after the construction of the Transmission Line and annually thereafter, for the term of this Agreement, the Company shall pay to the Landowner Annual Compensation on the following basis:

The sum of

- (a) Three Hundred Seventy Five (\$375.00) DOLLARS for each full Structure to be placed on Cultivated Lands within the Right-of-Way, and
- (b) One Hundred Seventy Five (\$175.00) DOLLARS for each full Structure to be placed on Head Lands within the Right-of-Way, and
- (c) One Hundred (\$100.00) DOLLARS for each full Structure to be placed on Uncultivated Lands within the Right-of-Way, and

8. MANNER OF PAYMENT OF ANNUAL COMPENSATION

(a) Annual Compensation shall be paid as follows:

Initial Annual Compensation Payment Following Construction of Transmission Line:

The Company shall issue the initial Annual Compensation payment following construction of any Structure on the Right-of-Way retroactively to the most recent anniversary date that has lapsed.

Annual Compensation shall be paid as follows after Initial Annual Compensation Payment:

The obligation to pay Annual Compensation under this Agreement shall terminate in the event that the Lands are no longer being used for agricultural purposes.

- (b) The Company shall not be required to issue more than one cheque for each payment of Annual Compensation. In the event that more than one person claims to be entitled to receive payment of Annual Compensation, the Company may make the cheque jointly payable to all persons claiming entitlement.
- (c) If at any time while this Agreement is in effect and the associated Structures have been constructed on the Right-of-Way, Uncultivated Lands upon which a Structure has been placed become Cultivated Lands or Head Lands, as appropriate, the Company shall pay to the Landowner additional compensation to adjust the payment of Annual Compensation upwards to the rate payable for Cultivated Lands with respect to that Structure as set forth in Clause 7 of this Agreement or as otherwise established from time to time. Such adjusted Annual Compensation shall be payable from the date written notice of cultivation is received by the Company; PROVIDED, HOWEVER, that cultivation has actually taken place on the Right-of-Way and involves operations described in the definition of Cultivated Lands contained in this Agreement.

9. REVIEW OF ANNUAL COMPENSATION

- (a) The amount of Annual Compensation payable under this Agreement shall be subject to review in accordance with the provisions of the Surface Rights Act of Alberta, as amended from time to time.
- (b) The Company may review and raise the Annual Compensation at any time and from time to time.
- (c) Upon notification to the Company by the Landowner of a bona fide change in the Landowner's agricultural operations which results in a non-recurring agricultural expense or increased annual farming losses or operating costs caused by the existence on the Right-of-Way of the Transmission Line, the Company shall initiate a review of the compensation payable hereunder. The notification shall include written evidence to substantiate the new expenses, losses or costs incurred by the Landowner. The Company shall consider such written evidence and, if satisfied, shall revise the compensation payable hereunder. If the parties cannot agree on the revised amount of compensation payable to the Landowner, the Landowner may submit the dispute for determination by the Surface Rights Board or its successor. In the event that the Surface Rights Board or its successor does not have jurisdiction to decide the matter at issue, the dispute shall be submitted to arbitration pursuant to the arbitration legislation then in force in the Province of Alberta.

10. TERMINATION OF AGREEMENT

This Agreement shall cease to be of any further force or effect and neither Party hereto shall have any further rights or obligations, if by the date which is the third anniversary of the date of this Agreement the Company has not paid to the Landowner the compensation for the grant of Right-of-Way set out in Clauses 5 and 6 hereof. If, as a result of the occurrence of the foregoing, this Agreement ceases to be of any further force or effect, then the Company shall forthwith execute and register such documents as may be necessary to release and discharge this Agreement from the Certificate(s) of Title for the Lands and upon the registration of such release or discharge, the Company shall notify the Landowner thereof.

11. USE OF RIGHT OF WAY

The Company shall not fence the Right-of-Way or any portion thereof and the Landowner shall have free access to, and use of, the Lands comprised in the Right-of-Way; PROVIDED, HOWEVER, that such access and use in favour of the Landowner shall not in any way interfere with the Company in the exercise of any of the rights granted by this Agreement nor interfere with any works of the Company situate within, upon or

over the Right-of-Way. The Landowner shall not erect or store upon the Right-of-Way any building, structures, materials, agricultural products or any other obstructions that, in the opinion of the Company, may in any way interfere with the safe and efficient transmission of electric energy across the Lands or the exercise by the Company of any of its rights herein granted. The Company shall have access through all gates on the Right-of-Way and Vegetation Control Easement at all times, and the Landowner shall leave all such gates free of locking devices or supply the Company with keys to all such locking devices installed. Where the Company requires access through an existing fence, or a fence hereafter constructed by the Landowner, the Company shall either repair the fence or construct a gate in such fence. Such gate shall be of sufficient width to admit passage of farm equipment.

12. DAMAGE PAYMENTS TO THE LANDOWNER

The Company shall be liable for physical and tangible damage done to real or personal property such as damage to the surface of the Lands, to any trees, crops or vegetation growing thereon, to livestock and to agricultural improvements, equipment and buildings owned by the Landowner or lawful occupant by reason of the exercise by the Company of any or all of the rights granted to it by this Agreement. The Company shall not be liable for damage caused to the property of the Landowner by his or her own act or omission, willful misconduct, or gross negligence, or by that of his servants, agents or contractors. In the event that the Parties cannot agree at any time on the amount of compensation for damages payable to the Landowner hereunder, the Parties shall submit the dispute for determination to the Surface Rights Board or its successor. In the event the Surface Rights Board or its successor does not have jurisdiction to decide the matter at issue, the dispute may be submitted to arbitration pursuant to the arbitration legislation then in force in the Province of Alberta.

13. RELEASE OF LANDOWNER FROM CLAIMS BY THE COMPANY

The Landowner shall not be liable to the Company for any damage caused to the Transmission Line which occurs as a result of the permitted use and occupation of the Right-of-Way by the Landowner or his or her agents, servants or contractors, excepting there out all damage caused by the willful misconduct or gross negligence of the Landowner, his agents, servants or contractors.

14. INDEMNIFICATION OF THE LANDOWNER BY THE COMPANY

The Company covenants and agrees to be liable to the Landowner for, and indemnify and save harmless the Landowner from and against all actions, suits, claims and demands made by any person or persons, in respect of any loss, injury or damage suffered by such person or persons, arising out of, or in connection with the exercise by the Company of its rights hereunder. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary contained herein, neither party shall be liable to the other party hereto in any way whatsoever for any indirect or consequential damages whatsoever whether or not such damages are foreseeable and whether or not a party is advised of the possibility of same. This provision shall survive the expiration or termination of this Agreement.

15. RESERVATION OF TITLE TO COMPANY PROPERTY

Notwithstanding any rule of law or equity, all property placed on the Right-of-Way by the Company shall, at all times, remain the property of the Company even though attached to the Lands and the Company may remove such property from the Lands at any time.

16. DISCONTINUANCE AND ABANDONMENT

In the event the Company, or its successors or assigns, no longer requires the right to maintain Structures on the Right-of-Way, it shall within a reasonable period of time remove all above-ground portions of the Structures, as well as such below-ground portions as required by applicable regulatory requirements at the time of removal, and terminate all rights and obligations hereunder and thereupon this Agreement shall come to an end and cease to be of any further force or effect. Upon the Company removing such Structures

from the Right-of-Way, it shall remediate all damage to the Right-of-Way arising as a result of the exercise by the Company of its rights hereunder and the Company shall remove and discharge any instrument or encumbrance registered against any certificate of title to the Lands and related to its interest in the Lands.

17. NOTICES AND PAYMENTS

All notices to be given hereunder shall be in writing and all such notices and any payments to be made hereunder may be made or served personally or by post.

or at such other address of which the Landowner or the Company respectively may from time to time advise, and any such notices or payments shall be deemed to be given to and received by the addressee upon personal service or, if served by post, fourteen (14) days after mailing thereof postage prepaid.

18. RESPONSIBILITY FOR NOTIFICATION OF CHANGE OF OWNERSHIP

The Landowner shall notify the Company promptly and in writing of any change in ownership of the Lands and the Company shall be entitled to continue to make payments to the existing Landowner (prior to the change in ownership) until satisfied of the status of the new owner of the Lands. The Landowner agrees not to retain the right to annual compensation payments upon the sale of the Lands and the Company shall be entitled to make such payments to the new landowner of the Lands in full discharge of its obligations hereunder.

19. TAXES

The Company shall pay all rates and taxes that may be assessed and levied against the Company from time to time as a result of its interest in the Right-of-Way or Vegetation Control Easement or as a result of its installations thereon or in connection with its operations thereon.

20. DEFAULT

Neither Party shall be considered in default in performance of its obligations under this Agreement, to the extent that the performance of such obligations or any of them, is delayed by circumstances which are beyond the control of the Landowner or the Company; PROVIDED HOWEVER, the Company shall not be in default in the performance of any of its covenants or obligations under this Agreement until the Landowner has notified the Company of such default and the Company has failed to commence timely action to remedy the same upon receipt of such notice.

21. COVENANT RUNNING WITH THE LAND

This Agreement and the rights herein granted to the Company shall run with and be annexed to the Lands and shall be of the same force and effect to all intents and purpose as a covenant running with the Lands and these presents, including all of the covenants and conditions herein contained shall be annexed to the Lands and shall extend to, be binding upon and inure to the benefit of the Parties hereto, their executors, administrators, successors and assigns, as the case may be.

22. ASSIGNMENT


The Company may mortgage, charge, encumber, transfer and assign the rights acquired under this Agreement without the consent of, and without further consideration becoming payable to, the Landowner.

EARLY RESOLUTION AND ACCESS AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT made the 35 day of Apr., 2019.

BETWEEN:

THE VILLAGE OF INNISFREE.

(hereinafter called the "Landowner")

- AND -

ATCO ELECTRIC LTD.

a body corporate, incorporated under the laws of the Province of Alberta

(hereinafter called the "Company")

WHEREAS the Landowner is the registered owner, or is entitled to become the registered owner, of an estate in fee simple subject to such encumbrances as are notified on the certificate of title, in that parcel of land in the Province of Alberta, being:

MERIDIAN 4 RANGE 11 TOWNSHIP 50 SECTION 34 ALL THAT PORTION OF THE NORTH EAST QUARTER WHICH LIES TO THE NORTH OF THE NORTH SHORE OF BIRCH LAKE AS SHOWN ON A PLAN OF SURVEY DATED 7 OCTOBER A.D. 1895 CONTAINING 25.1 HECTARES (62 ACRES) MORE OR LESS EXCEPTING THEREOUT:

A) ALL THAT PORTION NOT COVERED BY THE SAID LAKE, AND DESCRIBED AS FOLLOWS: COMMENCING AT A POINT ON THE EAST BOUNDARY OF THE SAID QUARTER SECTION 1970 FEET SOUTHERLY FROM THE NORTH EAST CORNER THEREOF; THENCE NORTHERLY ALONG THE SAID EAST BOUNDARY 970 FEET; THENCE WESTERLY AND PARALLEL TO THE NORTH BOUNDARY OF THE SAID QUARTER SECTION 1120 FEET; THENCE SOUTHERLY AND PARALLEL TO THE SAID EAST BOUNDARY 375 FEET; THENCE SOUTH EASTERLY IN A STAIGHT LINE TO THE POINT OF COMMENCEMENT, CONTAINING 17.30 ACRES MORE OR LESS B) 7.49 ACRES MORE OR LESS FOR WAYSIDE CAMPSITE, AS SHOWN ON ROAD PLAN 3378LZ C) 7.98 ACRES MORE OR LESS FOR ROAD, 0.78 OF AN ACRE MORE OR LESS FOR CONNECTING ROAD AND 0.46 OF AN ACRE MORE OR LESS FOR EXTRA ROAD, AS SHOWN ON ROAD PLAN 6060RS EXCEPTING THEREOUT ALL MINES AND MINERALS

(hereinafter called the "Lands");

AND WHEREAS the Company proposes to construct a transmission line on the Lands in order to transmit electric energy (the "Transmission Line") as part of its 7L65 Line Rebuild Project, (the "Project").

AND WHEREAS the Landowner consents to the Company's use of the Lands for such purposes and wishes to grant the Company early access to its Lands to perform certain activities;

NOW THEREFORE IN CONSIDERATION OF the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000.00) per titled parcel listed above and included in the Lands, to be paid to the Landowner by the Company in accordance with the provisions below, and in consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements hereinafter set forth, the parties hereto agree as follows:

1. The Landowner hereby acknowledges that the Company proposes to construct the Transmission Line across the Lands in accordance with the general routing as shown on the sketch plan initialed by the Landowner and attached as Schedule "A" (the "General Routing"), as initialed and amended to show preferred access to the General Routing (the "Preferred Access"). The Landowner has no objection to the General Routing, nor any objection to the Project or to the Alberta Utilities Commission granting a permit and licence to construct and operate the Transmission Line and all other facilities forming part of the Project. The Landowner undertakes not to object to, or intervene in, any proceedings before the Alberta Utilities Commission or any other regulatory agency in respect of any necessary regulatory approvals for the construction and operation of the Transmission Line and all other facilities forming part of the Project.

2. The Landowner hereby grants the Company and its agents, employees and contractors access to the Lands, at the Company's convenience, with such vehicles and other equipment as may be desired by the Company, for the purposes of conducting any or all of the following activities:

Legal Survey

a. to undertake all survey operations required to perform a legal survey including, but not limited to, cutting brush or trees for sight lines and placing legal survey marker pins and posts;

Soils Survey

b. to inspect soil and subsoil types, topsoil depths, and other such activities which may include the taking of samples and other similar soil disturbances;

Geotechnical Survey

 to undertake all necessary geotechnical surveys and analyses required to determine appropriate placement of any structures to support electric energy conductors, other wires and equipment;

Environmental Survey

d. to undertake all environmental surveys required to assess any potential environmentally sensitive areas;

Historical Resources Impact Assessment

e. to inspect known historical sites, to identify undiscovered historical sites, and to perform all other activities necessary to complete an historical resources impact assessment in accordance with the provisions of the *Historical Resources Act*; and

Other

- f. such further and other preliminary surveys or assessments as the Company may reasonably require.
- 3. The Company agrees to pay the Landowner two thousand dollars (\$2,000.00) per titled parcel listed above and included in the Lands as follows:
 - a. \$1,000.00 payable to the Landowner upon execution of this Early Resolution and Access Agreement; and
 - b. \$1,000.00 payable to the Landowner upon commencement of actual construction (excluding the above activities) of the Transmission Line in accordance with the executed Right of Way Agreement; provided, however, that such \$1,000.00 shall not be payable in the event that the Company does not proceed with actual construction of the Transmission Line on the Lands.
- 4. The Company agrees to compensate the Landowner for any physical and tangible damage to real or personal property caused by the access contemplated under this Agreement. In the event that the parties cannot agree upon appropriate compensation for damages, the dispute shall be submitted to arbitration pursuant to the arbitration legislation then in force in the Province of Alberta, unless the parties otherwise agree in writing.



CHIEF ADMINISTRATIVE OFFICERS REPORT

APRIL 23, 2019 – MAY 21, 2019

Administration & Public Works

Administration and Public Works has been working diligently to install new Water Meters. We have currently replaced roughly 46 water meters. Our Goal is to have at least 50% completed by the end of May 2019.

Administration and Public Works had a meeting with Bar Engineering regarding some infrastructure upgrades within the Village. We included a few items from our 10 Year Capital Plan but have also added road repairs on HWY 870 as well as the upgrades within the Administration Building. We should be hearing from Bar Engineering shortly.

I have applied for funding through the Federal Gas Tax Fund to assist the Village in the above repairs. We currently awaiting a response. Should the Village not be successful through the Federal Gas Tax Fund, we will then apply for MSI Operating and Capital.

Administration has been working diligently on complete the 2019 Tax Rate Bylaw. Scenarios will be presented to Council at the June 18, 2019 Regular Council Meeting. I encourage Council to consider having a Public Hearing or Special Meeting regarding the 2019 Tax Rate Bylaw and 2019 Operating/Capital Budget. As per our Viability Review and directives issued by the Minister of Municipal Affairs, it is recommended that the Village Council engage the residents of the Village when considering the 2019 Tax Rate and budget.

Please pass a motion setting a date for a Public Hearing to review and implement the 2019 Tax Rate Bylaw and Operating/Capital Budget.

Canada Summer Jobs employees are set to start on July 1, 2019. We have been approved for 3 positions: Administrative Assistant, Public Works Assistant and Recreation Park Assistant. We have received a few applications for all positions. The Administrative Assistant position has been filled. The other 2 positions will remain open until June 10th to ensure all applications are received

The 2018 Financial Statement and Financial Information Return has been presented to Council. I would like to Thank our Auditor, Brian King for the hard work.

Administration has drafted Utility Rate Scenarios for Council review and consider. As per the Viability Review and directives issued by the Minister of Municipal Affairs, it is recommended that the Village review the Utility Rate each year to ensure fill cost recovery.

Bylaw Enforcement

Bylaw Enforcement is on-going.

After the water meters are installed, Administration and Public Works will start setting traps for the stray cats wondering around town. We have set a protocol for this process. Any animal found with or without a collar will be held for 48 hours and advertised on all social media. Should the owner not claim the animals, they will be taken to the SPCA or Vermilion Vet Clinic.

Administration will be diligent in enforcing the Unsightly premises bylaw, Noise Bylaw and Animal Control Bylaw. I will be advertising these bylaws on the Village Social media pages to ensure awareness. Now that the Village has help in the Administration Office, Bylaw Enforcement will be priority.







Dear Mayor Cannan:

At CN, we are committed to environmental safety and sustainability. We are reaching out in order to advise you, that we will be undertaking vegetation control activities for safety purposes, in your area between April 29, 2019 and July 31, 2019. This information will also be made available on the CN website (www.cn.ca/vegetation) shortly.

If not managed properly, trees, brush or other vegetation can severely compromise public safety, including by impeding the view motorists have of incoming trains, increasing the risk of crossing accidents. Moreover, unwanted vegetation can damage the integrity of the railway, increasing the risk of incidents, interfere with signals and switches, contribute to track side fires, compromise employee safety, reduce visibility for train crews at road crossings, of signals and other track side warning devices, to name only a few risks. Our annual vegetation control program is designed to mitigate these risks by eliminating brush, weeds and other undesirable vegetation.

For 2019, CN has retained Asplundh Services to conduct vegetation control along its Canadian rail network.

Should your Town/City have any noxious weed removal requests, we ask that you contact CN's Public Inquiry Line at contact@cn.ca before June 26, 2019 with the specific information and location. CN will make every effort to include those locations as part of our 2019 Vegetation Management Program. All notices sent after the above mentioned date will be included in the 2020 Vegetation Control Management Plan.

We look forward to collaborating with you and answering any questions you may have regarding our vegetation control activities in your community. In that respect, please find attached the Notices CN is publishing in local papers in order to advise the public. We would kindly ask that you post copies on your Community's website and at City Hall or other central locations for a wider distribution.

COMMUNITY NOTICE Annual Vegetation Management Program

CN is required to clear its rights-of-way from any vegetation that may pose a safety hazard. Vegetation on railway rights-of-way, if left uncontrolled, can contribute to trackside fires and impair proper inspection of track infrastructure.

As such, for safe railway operations, the annual vegetation control program will be carried out on CN rail lines in the province of Alberta. A certified applicator will be applying herbicides on and around the railway tracks (mainly the graveled area/ballast). All product requirements for setbacks in the vicinity of dwellings, aquatic environments and municipal water supplies will be met.

At this time, we expect that the program will take place from April 29, 2019 to July 31, 2019.



Why does CN need to remove vegetation along its train tracks annually?

Safety at CN is one of our most important core values, and part of maintaining and operating a safe railway is ensuring vegetation is managed along our corridor. CN also has an obligation, pursuant to the *Rules Respecting Track Safety*, adopted under the *Railway Safety Act*, to ensure that vegetation on or immediately adjacent to the railway roadbed is controlled. More specifically, the Rules require federal railways to ensure the track is free of vegetation that could create fire hazards, affect the track integrity or obstruct visibility of operations and inspections. Separate regulations also require removal of vegetation to ensure every grade crossing meets sightline requirements.

Where does CN remove vegetation?

Please note that for the management of vegetation, CN divides its corridor into two components: the ballast and the right of way. The ballast section (graveled area) covers a 16ft width (4.9m). The right of way section covers a 42ft width (13m) on each side of the ballast (graveled area).



Vegetation in the right of way section needs to be controlled to protect sight lines for train crews to see signal systems and at road crossings, prevent trees from fouling the track during storms, reduce fuel loading to prevent fires, minimize wildlife mortality, ensure

good drainage along ditches and culverts, amongst other safety requirements and is primarily controlled mechanically, through mowing and cutting of vegetation. Certain herbicide products are used (excluding glyphosate) to encourage grasses and small plants rather than shrubs and trees.

The ballast section, on the other hand, is the most critical area as it supports the track infrastructure which supports the movement of freight and passengers; this section also provides an area for train crew to safely inspect their train. Given the crucial role it plays in ensuring the safety and integrity of rail operations, this section must be devoid of all vegetation. The only proven way to effectively remove vegetation in the ballast section is through chemical application.





How will you manage dry plants and herbs left once the spraying is complete?

Ensuring vegetation is controlled on an annual basis is the best method to reduce larger volumes of dead and dry plants. This is because it kills plants when they are smaller which reduces the amount and volume of dead plant material. CN's 2019 program has been developed specifically with this in mind. Most plants, once dead, will naturally decay leaving little debris. As for the right of way, the herbicides used are selective and the grass cover will remain intact while any broadleaved species or noxious weeds will be controlled.

Will you be using Glyphosate. If so, is it dangerous for us or my pets?

All pesticides used in Canada must be registered by Health Canada's Pest Management Regulatory Agency (PMRA) and CN only uses pesticides that have been approved for use in Canada and in the Province within which they are applied. Protection of human health and the environment is Health Canada's primary

objective in the regulation of pesticides and all pesticides must undergo rigorous science-based assessments before being approved for sale in Canada. The PMRA also re-evaluates registered pesticides on a cyclical basis to ensure they continue to meet modern health and environmental standards. In this regard, the PMRA re-evaluated glyphosate in 2017 and reaffirmed its conclusions that products containing glyphosate do not present risks of concern to human health or the environment when used in accordance with revised label directions. CN's vegetation control contractor uses glyphosate in accordance with label directions.

Has CN tried any non-chemical weed control options in the past, such as weed whacking? Have they worked?

CN has used weed cutting in the past to control vegetation, but this does not remove the roots, and actually encourages more growth, therefore it is not an effective long-term solution for vegetation removal along railway tracks. The application of steam injection has also been investigated; however they have proven ineffective in killing the roots, which could compromise the integrity of the rail bed.

CN has also explored other options, such as high concentrate—vinegar (acetic acid), however this was deemed not a viable option as the acid reacts negatively with steel and the sensitive electronic monitoring equipment used to regulate safe movement and operation of trains.

I am an organic farmer adjacent to your tracks, should I be worried?

Most of the vegetation control focuses on the ballast section (graveled area) which is 16ft (4.9 meters) wide, leaving about 13 meters of right of way on each side of the ballast. The equipment used for application is a shrouded boom which focuses the spray downward to reduce potential drift. Application must also be done during appropriate weather conditions, including low wind levels.

Can I request my area not be sprayed?

Safety is of upmost importance to CN and vegetation control is a key component of keeping our employees and the communities in which we operate safe. Ensuring vegetation is kept clear of our infrastructure, signals, road crossing sight lines and enabling our teams to inspect and maintain the track is critically important. As a result, we cannot choose to have a reduced safety management process in some areas and so all areas of the CN ballast section must be treated to control vegetation.



ATCO Electric Ltd. has filed applications for new transmission lines in the Vegreville and Vermilion areas.

The Alberta Utilities Commission (AUC), the independent utilities regulator, will be holding a hearing to review the applications and submissions received to consider the electric transmission development applications in Proceeding 24102.

ATCO Electric Ltd. has applied, under the *Hydro and Electric Energy Act*, to rebuild the existing 144-kilovolt (kV) Transmission Line 7L65, to allow the facility to operate at full thermal capacity. Transmission Line 7L65 is located between the existing Vegreville 709S Substation and the existing Vermillon 710S Substation.

ATCO Electric Ltd. is seeking approval to construct a new single-circuit 144-kV transmission line. This new line will replace the existing Transmission Line 7L65. The rebuilt line will consist of an approximately 22-kilometre segment (designated as Transmission Line 7L134) between the Vegreville 709S Substation and the approved Vincent 2019S Substation, and an approximately 77-kilometre segment (designated as new Transmission Line 7L65) between the Vincent 2019S Substation and the Vermilion 710S Substation. ATCO Electric Ltd. is also seeking approval to alter the approved Transmission Line 7LA65 and to alter the existing 144-kV Transmission Line 7L129.



Application details

The attached map identifies the applied-for routes, which include a preferred route and five alternative route segments (collectively called the alternate route) for new Transmission Line 7L65 and Transmission Line 7L134.

The Commission may approve the preferred route, the alternate route, or a combination of the preferred route and one or more alternative route segments.



Cybercrime is on the Rise

The past few months have seen a significant uptick in cybercrime. Almost every week, we see news of another company that has been hit and subsequently shut down temporarily while they sort out how to recover. If you are interested, I have provided a few highlights on the back page.

The main purpose of these attacks is to extort or steal money. However, there has been new evidence to suggest that if a high value target is accessed and information stolen, drives may be encrypted with a crypto locker to cover evidence of the theft.

On the dark web your information is for sale. \$10 for your Facebook credentials, \$20 for your credit card number, \$150 for your credit-equipped Amazon account.

Beazley Breach Response (BBR) Services found that 71% of ransomware attacks **targeted small businesses**. You ARE a target, regardless of your size.

Small-to-medium sized companies were the most sought over targets because they will usually spend a lot less on securing their computing systems and information than larger firms according to the report, making it a lot easier for malicious actors to compromise their systems.

The top three organizations who experienced this type of incident are from healthcare (34%), professional services (12%), and financial institutions (12%), while government (6%), real estate (4%), and hospitality (3%) closed the rankings.

High profile cyberattacks.

- Arizona Beverages "rebuilding its network almost two weeks after the attack hit, wiping hundreds of Windows computers and servers and effectively shutting down sales operations for days until incident response was called in..."
- Norsk Hydro Large scale ransom cyberattack of unknown origin, with hackers demanding a ransom. Norsk decided to NOT pay the ransom but replace computers and restore from backups. After one week it had cost Norsk \$40 million.
- HOYA Corp. hit by a cyberattack at the end of February led to a partial shutdown of production in Thailand for three days. Around 100 computers were infected with malware designed to steal user credentials and then drop a cryptocurrency miner in the second stage.
- Genesee County, Michigan Hit by ransomware attack that shut them down for almost a week.
- Attacks in April have managed to target industrial safety systems such as those that open a pressure release valve or turn on emergency cooling systems.

Other cyber attacks have downed electricity grids and transport systems in recent years, and an attack on Italian oil services firm Sapien late last year destroyed more than 300 of the company's computers.

Getting on Top of the Cloud

Facebook Passwords Stored in Plain Text since 2012

Facebook has been mining user data for years. It logs our political stances, relationship histories and even phone records. Recent information suggests that it has been logging something else, too: unencrypted passwords.

As per the recent news, hundreds of millions of passwords have been stored in plain text by Facebook-created applications. This information has been searched by around 2,000 Facebook engineers and has been interrogated on over 9 million occasions.

According to the social media firm's Vice President of Engineering, Security, and Privacy, Pedro Canahuati, the unencrypted passwords were discovered during a standard security review at the beginning of this year. He went on to say that the firm had addressed the issue and would send precautionary notifications to all affected users.

Millions affected

Canahuati explained that the passwords were never made available to any third parties and that the firm had seen no evidence of their abuse or improper access by Facebook employees. At the time of the press release, Facebook expected to be contacting tens of thousands of Instagram users, tens of millions of regular Facebook users and hundreds of millions of Facebook Lite users.

According to Canahuati, Facebook Lite is a mobile app version that provides Facebook services in low connectivity areas. The app is popular in regions such as the Philippines, Indonesia, India, Mexico and Brazil.

Although Facebook Lite users represent the vast majority of affected individuals, it is clear that other applications were also involved. Canahuati explained that Facebook applications were only supposed to store a mathematical representation of user passwords and not the passwords themselves.

How to protect yourself

If you have any privacy concerns, it may be worth changing your Facebook and Instagram passwords. It is also important to avoid using the same password for multiple accounts. Choose strong, complex passwords for each of your accounts. You may find a password manager app useful.

Facebook offers a number of measures that prevent third parties from using stolen login details. These measures include two-factor authentication and the use of a USB security key. For those who have already had their passwords exposed, however, these authentication models may not be effective.

News Bytes

Facebook and Google Conned out of \$121 Million

Lithuanian Evaldas Rimasauskas has recently admitted conning Facebook and Google into sending him over \$100 million. Pleading guilty to one count of wire fraud, Rimasauskas will forfeit \$49.7 million.

Working with unknown co-conspirators, the man is said to have assisted a fake email campaign targeting Facebook and Google employees. These emails were disguised to look as though they came from Taiwanese hardware firm Quanta Computer and requested funds from the two firms.

Rimasauskas told the judge that between October 2013 and October 2015, he pretended to be a Quanta employee, created fake bank accounts in Latvia and Cyprus and signed counterfeit documents to support the wire transfers.

Assistant U.S. Attorney Eun Young Choi explained to the judge that Rimasauskas did not encourage the firms to send any money, and that his only role in the wire transfers was to set up the bank accounts. By his own admission, however, Rimasauskas was aware that his actions constituted fraud.

Phishers Set Their Sights on Amex and Netflix Customers

Earlier this week, Microsoft cybersecurity experts reported that they have spotted two new email-based phishing campaigns targeting Amex and Netflix customers. According to the experts, both of these campaigns are carefully crafted, with convincing logos and even online forms that accurately replicate those on the Amex and Netflix websites.

It is unclear whether these two campaigns were launched by the same group though they were launched at the same time. Microsoft has encouraged extra vigilance in the days and weeks to come.

At Close Range

Both the Amex and Netflix attacks claim that the user has account issues and must take directed steps to resolve them. This is a common tactic with phishing scams.

Such campaigns are becoming more regular and sophisticated. Indeed, Microsoft experts noted a 250% increase in similar attacks last year. According to the firm, more than 20% of us are still convinced by phishing messages and click the redirecting links within them.

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Question of the Month

Question: Why do I get bounce-back emails from unfamiliar addresses?

Answer:

While bounce-back emails are often legitimate, they could be caused by unsolicited email (spam) or malicious messages.

There are a number of reasons why a bounce-back email may not be all it seems. Three examples are as follows:

- 1. A spammer could be using your domain name to create fake email senders. For example, they could be using fake@companyname.com, fake1@ companyname.com, fake1@ companyname.com, etc.;
- 2. A spammer could be circulating through millions of emails addresses, using them all to trick spam filters into accepting the messages;
- 3. A spammer could be distributing their messages using a server that bounces invalid emails. They could be sending their spam emails to the server using the 'From:' address field. Because the emails entered would be invalid, the server would bounce them back to the "spammed" users. If your domain is set up so all emails sent to it are redirected to a catch-all account, disable or limit them. You should, instead, specify your valid email addresses (e.g. support@companyname.com).

Does that mean that your account was hacked? probably not. Your email address, as explained, is likely being used by a spammer to circumvent spam filters. Unfortunately, it is easy to spoof an email address; you simply tell the recipient's email server that the message is from a specific account.

Google Play Store Brimming with Unreliable Anti-virus Apps

Independent testing agency AV-Comparatives has recently published the results of an enlightening study into Android security products. Examining 250 Android-based security products, the study assessed whether products available in the Google Play store could protect against 2,000 of the most common Android threats.

AV-Comparatives deems an anti-virus product ineffective and unsafe if it fails to block at least 30% of the most common threats. Of the 250 security products tested, only 80 passed this test.

What's more...

It was discovered that some security apps were not searching for malicious code. Instead, they were simply cross-referencing package names with a list of approved and disallowed packages. As a result, attackers are able to circumvent security walls by simply renaming their malicious apps.

It gets worse...

The most ridiculous discovery was that some anti-virus apps flagged themselves as malicious software. This happened in cases where the developers had forgotten to add their own software to the approved anti-virus product lists.

Misleading reviews

Although many of these anti-virus apps were found to be unsafe, they all had notably similar interfaces. Also, despite being ineffective, many had four- or five-star reviews in the

Google Play Store. These Google Play Store reviews are misleading, encouraging users to download Android antivirus products that may be untrustworthy.

A few reliable products

Of the 250 tested products, only 23 succeeded in correctly detecting 100% of the malware samples. Bitdefender Mobile Security, for example, achieved a perfect score and caused no false positives.

The products that proved most reliable came from well-known firms. Many of these companies have been operating in the industry for years.

Android users are, therefore, recommended to choose security products developed by well-recognized brands. As well as being independently tested, these companies will have professional websites, privacy policies and customer support services. Users should also be able to try before they buy. Generally, free trial periods will be available.

Don't be fooled

Although an anti-virus app may be in the Google Play Store, it may not be reliable. Stick to brands you know, but be aware that some fraudsters masquerade as reputable businesses to trick Android users. Remember, reviews can be misleading. They may be real, they may be misinformed or they may even be fake. Read them but don't rely on them. To be sure that you're downloading the right app, get it directly from the developer's website

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


