- Bylaw 661-20 Subdivision & Development Appeal Board Bylaw (Second and Third Reading)
- Mayor and Council appointed the Bylaw Enforcement Officer, Subdivision & Development Appeal Board Clerk and Member of Council.

New Business:

- Appointment of Bylaw Enforcement Officer: Mayor and Council passed a motion appointing the Chief Administrative Officer as the Bylaw Enforcement Officer for the Village of Innisfree in accordance with Bylaw 660-20.
- Appointment of SDAB Clerk & Council Member: Mayor and Council passed a motion appointing the Chief Administrative Officer as the Clerk as well as appointed Deputy Mayor Cannan as the Council Member for the Subdivision & Development Appeal Board in accordance with Bylaw 661-20.
- CARES Grant Invigorate Innisfree Economic Development Strategy: Mayor and Council reviewed Ms. Amanda Davis (Management Consultant) letter dated April 12, 2020. After much discussion, Mayor and Council passed a resolution to return the grant funds to the province and to terminate the agreement with Ms. Amanda Davis in this regard.
- Village of Innisfree Library 2020 Municipal Contribution: Mayor and Council approved the Village of Innisfree Library Board 2020 Municipal Contribution in the amount of \$3,500.00.
- Other items discussed: 2021 Go East of Edmonton Advertising Renewal, Innisfree Library Board 2021 Budget, Trans Canada Yellowhead Highway Association 2021 Municipal Contribution, 2020 Staff Honorariums, Quote Dated September 17, 2020 Vehicle Decals (Public Works Truck/Equipment) and Alberta Police Interim Advisory Board (APIAB) Quarterly Report

The meeting was then adjourned.

SUBDIVISION AND DEVELOPMENT APPEAL BOARD REQUEST FOR MEMBERS OF PUBLIC AT LARGE

The Village of Innisfree requires two (2) members of public at large for the Subdivision and Development Appeal Board. This quasi-judicial body, appointed by Council, makes impartial and unbiased decisions on challenges of subdivision or development authority decisions and stop work orders. Deliberations are based on the municipal planning documents such as the Land Use Bylaw and Municipal Development Plans, provincial statute and information presented by hearing participants.

Subdivision and Development Appeal Board hearings are scheduled as required. Board members are appointed for a one (1) year term with an option to be reappointed for a second term.

Village residents with an interest or experience in planning or development activities are invited to submit a resume including a statement on your interest and abilities in serving in this capacity.

Mandatory training is required upon appointment.


