Per Alberta.ca: When you approach a school or play-ground sign, with a maximum speed posted with it, you are entering a school and/or playground zone. You must not exceed the posted speed when the zone is in effect.

The speed limit for both urban and rural school zones and playground zones is 30 km/h unless otherwise posted. While school zone limits are in effect



on school days only,

the entire stretch of road past the Delnorte School is also a playground zone.

Playground speed restrictions are in effect **EVERY DAY** from 8:30 am to 1 hour after sunset.

2023 Tax Notice Explanation

In previous years working for various municipalities, I found that many people did not understand their Property Tax Notices, so I sent out an explanation with either the spring Utility billing or the Property Tax Notices themselves. However, since it may not be the same people that pay the Property Tax Notice as who pay the Utility bill, now I ensure everyone gets a copy of this explanation.

Many requests were related as to what each line item was. More information is also available in the Tax Levy Bylaw that is passed every year by Council. A copy is available either on the website or requesting one from the Village Office.

School Levy

This number is given to us by the Province of Alberta. They set the requisition amount required to be paid by each municipality to the Provincial Education dept. We take their requisition amount and divide it by the assessment of each applicable property. You may not know, but municipalities do not get a dime of this requisition amount. We are basically the tax collectors on behalf of the Province. If you have any questions about what you have to pay to the Province, please contact:

ASFF Education assessment: Alberta Education Property Tax Line toll-free by dialing 310-0000 and then 780-422-7125 or dial direct

Housing Levy

This is the amount that we are requisitioned by the MD of Minburn Housing Association. The amount changes from year to year. We receive their request and divide the amount by the total assessment for the Village and that is what each individual property owner pays to support senior's housing in the Village.

<u>Municipal Levy</u> – This amount is generated by the Budget that is passed for that year. The total amount requisitioned is divided by the total Village's assessment to arrive at a "mill rate". That mill rate is applied to each property in proportion to their part of the total assessment to arrive at the amount each property will pay for that year's taxes. This is the only amount on the total Tax Notice that the Village actually gets to use for ALL Village operations.

<u>Over or Under Levy</u> – this applies to the Seniors Foundation, and Alberta Education. Under or over levies are calculated when the Village has budgeted a certain amount in a year and the actual amount collected is different by the end of the year. This could be for various reasons such as people getting their properties reassessed and the Village having to adjust their Property Tax Notice to reflect the new assessment. But since the Levy has to equal the specified amount every year, the Village must adjust the following year's levy to the property owners to compensate for either the shortfall or surplus from the previous year. So this amount will change from year to year.

HONEY GARLIC CHICKEN PITA w/ WHIPPED FETA

INGREDIENTS:

-4 TBSP Olive Oil, divided -4 boneless, skinless chicken breasts, cubed in 1 inch cubes -2 tsp seasoning salt -Pepper to taste -½ cup Honey -1 tbsp Sriracha -4 garlic cloves, minced and divided -1/2 cup chicken broth -8 oz Feta cheese -1/3 cup Milk -2 tbsp lemon juice -1 tbsp chopped fresh oregano (or use the dried stuff like I 1 Bell pepper finely cubed (or half yellow/half red it's prettier!)

-½ red onion, finely chopped
-½ cucumber, finely cubed
-½ cup chopped cherry tomatoes

-1 tsp red wine vinegar

-Pita or naan bread, one for each person but everyone will want two!

Whipped Feta Directions:

In a food processor, add feta, milk, lemon juice, 1 minced garlic clove, and oregano. Pulse until combined and stream in half the olive oil, mix until smooth. Taste it – to die for!

Honey Garlic Sauce Directions:

In a small bowl, whisk together honey, broth, sriracha, and 3 minced garlic cloves.

Chicken Directions:

In a medium skillet over medium heat, add half the olive oil. Add chicken, seasoning salt and pepper and cook for about two minutes. Add your Honey Garlic sauce to the skillet and turn up the heat a bit, stirring and cooking until chicken is glazed with thickened sauce, about 5 minutes. Set aside.

Fresh veggie topper directions:

In a medium bowl, mix the bell pepper, cucumber, tomatoes, red onion and vinegar.

Pita Directions:

Brush a little olive oil on both sides of your pita and "char|" both sides in a frying pan. (I just fried both sides until the bread was nice and warm and soft.)

Assembly:

Spread a generous dollop of the whipped feta on your warm pita. Add a large scoop of warm chicken, and top with your fresh veggies. Fold the pita in half like a big taco, and YUM!

If you are out and about today, especially working in the yard, you might want

to throw a few stones in your pocket to keep you from blowing into next year! Farmer Hubby and I were continuing with our spring yard work but had to shut down for lunch as the wind was whipping the grass and leaves away faster than we could get them raked into some semblance of a pile! He is a bit anxious to get things all in order, but I keep telling him we have lots of time yet. He has had his leaf 'vacuum' fired up and was cleaning up the yard like a mini tornado and then he was cussing the wind when it would deposit more leaves where he had already cleaned, I say it just keeps him out of trouble!



I was doing so good about refraining from starting too many seedlings until about March 20th when I figured I was safe. I mean worse case scenario I could have all those little plants out in the greenhouse by mid April, wrong! So about half of the kitchen table is out of commission covered in red solo cups with tomatoes plants that are starting to look a bit spindly. One day I decided it would be safe to carry a few pepper plants down to the greenhouse, muck around in the dirt down there to replant them and then haul them back up to the house. Apparently my definition of a nice

day was still darn chilly if you are a pepper seedling and several of them shrivelled up and their leaves turned black. Lesson learned!! The few petunias that I started this year are certainly not happy campers, maybe about six of them might grow into viable plants and blossom sometime in September, if the frost stays away that long. I guess the first year when I had such great success must have been beginners' luck as these last two years I have struggled to get the plants to cooperate.

Recently I took an old horse water trough, drilled some holes in the bottom and following a recipe off Pinterest, remodified it into a raised garden bed! The article suggested you fill the tub 2/3 full of tree branches and we had an abundance of them, then add in some brown material like leaves and old grass and we had lots of that on hand as well, finally a thin layer of compost, yep had that and a top layer of black dirt which again we have in no short supply. I am hoping to grow an array of lettuces in it for salads, the idea being that I will be able to keep the chickweed from overwhelming the lettuce again stay tune to see how this experiment turns out!

There are a couple of residents that are not so happy with the addition of a dog to the family! Firstly the squirrels are not impressed, he has yet been able to catch one but he sure gives them a lively chase and at least it keeps them on their toes! The barn cats as well felt things were just fine without the add on of a canine! In

fact, they coordinated a front-line attack on him when he was least expecting one. I was in the pasture with the horses when I looked up to check on things; I saw one cat glaring at the dog from the corner of the barn, he gave the other cat a significant look over his shoulder and ran straight for Keeper, tail fuzzed out and back arched hissing and spitting. The second in command came hurtling after him throwing herself on the dog's back. Poor Keeper didn't know what to do and his confusion was compounded with me yelling "stop, stop that" thinking perhaps he was the one I was upset with! Climbing the fence and coming to Keeper's rescue I shoed the cats away. They only retreated after coming after me and receiving a swat that sent the one tumbling across the grass. I reassured Keeper that he was a good boy and threatened to rehome the cats if they pull a stunt like that again.
