

We had a great season of softball these past few months. We practiced sat the Innisfree Ball Diamonds and we have three age groups this year: U6, U9 and U14.



Big thanks to Pioneer and Land Seed and Agro for sponsoring our new shirts this year.



Greetings Residents of Innisfree and area,

I would like to take some time to address some of the many issues being brought forward recently. Please do accept the apologies of myself and the other council members to those residents who have not felt heard or listened to recently. You have my commitment to listen and act whenever possible.

- 1. Village Staffing As of June 27th, 2012, Interim CAO Terri Wiebe is no longer employed by the Village of Innisfree. I ask for your patience while we transition and plan forward. By the time you're reading this article I am hoping to have worked with the other council members on a plan forward. CAO Brooke Magosse plans to return full time in October. We had three summer students hired for the summer and now only have two as the other decided to work elsewhere. We will be working to fill these vacancies and use grant funding provided by the Federal Government. Thanks to our remaining summer students for their commitment to the Village. Staffing is stable in other areas. I do have one request which is to remember when constructive and welcomed criticism turns to ranting and raving on Facebook and other forums, that our staff are human and do feel. In many ways they are doing their best to complete the day-to-day activities that had been assigned to them. Council will work with the new Interim CAO (when that person is appointed) to complete as many projects as possible and to notify residents of projects with notice. We all acknowledge that there is room for improvement.
- 2. **Vegetation Control** you may have heard that the Village had contracted vegetation specialists to control weeds identified as invasive and required to be controlled by the provincial government. I am saddened to report that some of our residents made it impossible for these individuals to complete their work. This was then followed up with a letter from the Village that came across as threatening. That was not the intention of Council. This project has failed due to communication right from the beginning. The fact of the matter is we must control these weeds or face punishment from the province. This may come in many ways, one of which is financial. I ask when our contractors return that you all welcome them and let them complete their work. Also, to help, please control vegetation on your own properties. I know I have some work to do.
- 3. **Bylaw Enforcement** Village Council has heard many complaints on bylaw enforcement. In order to combat this, we hired a part time bylaw enforcement office on a contract basis. This individual has the authority to enforce bylaws and will be issuing warning enforcing our local bylaws. Complaints heard include animals at large, unsightly property, trees and other vegetation overhanging sidewalks and more.
- 4. **Speed by the school** it has been brought forward by some residents that speeding by the school is an issue again. Please obey the signage and ensure our kids are safe when playing at the playground. Please remember that even though school is now out children still play in the school yard, go to the library and play on the playground.

I hope many of you take part in the Pancake breakfast and festivities at the campground on CANADA DAY. I look forward to seeing you there and at the Fair on August 9th. Please continue to contact the Village office with questions and concerns.

- -Roll into balls the size of a walnut. Bake at 350 degrees for 10 to 12 minutes.



Welcome everybody to the Campground corner I have some very exciting news to share with you. It seems that our area has some history that out dates everything!

75 million years ago, this area was once known as the BEAR PAW SEA also known as the birch lake foundation in geographical terms. This area was once all under the sea level now I am here to share with you some information

A little over 100 years ago years ago in 1913 an amateur palaeontologist was curious about the lake bed, and the cliffs that surrounded the Birch Lake.


This said the man found some fossils located on the north side of Birch Lake in Alberta geology the lake is categorized into two parts. there's the lower birch lake, and the upper birch lake. This area was once under all of what they called the BEAR PAW SEA now these fossils that they are looking for at this time are of crustaceans that would've been living in the bottom of the ocean. Also oyster fossils.

I would like to introduce, Steve Kary a palaeontologist from Red Deer and his team, who are here to see if they can find those fossils once again, on the edge or areas in which the hundred-year-old paper was written. This is giving us a great opportunity to have the Birch Lake in the Alberta Archives palaeontology records.

Steve reached out to me in regards to this paper to see if my knowledge of the lake would help them to pinpoint these areas as I myself have been collecting rocks all over the lake shore, and have found some unusual rocks and would like to see if we can classify them as gemstones and any fossils.

For the next three days in July Steve and his team and myself, with the help of some other locals, are going to do an exploration of the areas in which we believe we will be able to find some fossils if they are successful in finding said fossils, they will then request for a permit from the Alberta government to do some archaeological. digging this, in no manner will harm the waters or the areas or affect any locals in any manner. This is a government permit to allow them to search along the water edges.

Along with looking for these fossils, we have also contacted archeologists in regards to some native artifacts, and some native indigenous hunting grounds that were in the area before the village became in town And as I have recently learned that there seems to be some old Buffalo kill sites around Birch Lake, which makes sense since back



then the land was all fields, and the cliffs would've provided an excellent space for the natives to push the buffalo off of the cliffs in order to complete a kills. We are also asking if any locals have any information on any native artefacts or areas that may have been found or dug up over the years. The archeologists would like to date stamp and add these to the Canadian archives. All they are requesting is to see photos or even to be able to take photos of these artefacts just so that they can put it into the database for any further future references.

I myself am of indigenous background that's finding means a lot to me in a spiritual manner and culture, having the opportunity to find such sites and be able to locate them will also give the Birch Lake Campground the opportunity to have a spot where travellers would be drawn to just for those reasons just like the pico-graphs, these areas would be highly protected. There would be no ability to dig up any artefacts they would just be a Point of Interest in which that they would be able to visit and take a look around.

This month's first items include a gorgeous curling iron stand, as well as a very old curling iron itself, both donated by Erica Mansell in 1999. The curling iron, having been manufactured in France, as proven by the engraving along the rod, also has what looks either to be an "8" or an "S" engraved near the joint. The entire length of the utensil measures about 26.5cm, the charred barrel of the iron itself measuring 13cm.

Along with her donation, Erica Mansell wrote: "This curling iron was used to curl hair by myself, my mother (Mrs. Robert Weder Sr.), my brothers and whoever happened to be around. One had to be careful from burning the hair. This was before the first permanents were available."

Jo and Meg in the 1994 cinematic adaptation of Louisa May Alcott's Little Women are depicted using a similar old curling iron, Jo proceeds to accidentally burn Meg's hair off. Without electricity, these curling irons were often let heat up in the fireplace or wood-burning oven, then used on the hair much the same as we use curling irons today: clamping the rod shut on small locks of hair, then wrapping the length around the barrel for several seconds before releasing to reveal a ringlet. There were a multitude of techniques used to curl the hair, later there were many methods of creating waves. With having to reheat the curling rod between uses, you can imagine that this was a time-consuming process.

The iron would then have been placed down onto a stand: "This stand was used to put the hot curling irons on while combing the hair. This was probably used before or during the 1950's."

It's difficult not to imagine a family gathering around a fireplace,


a young woman, grinning in excitement along with her mother, standing behind her, scalding hot curling iron in hand, at the thought of her half-curled hair, her giddy brothers next in line.



Notice is hereby given that the 2023 combined Assessment/Tax Notices have been prepared and mailed to all taxpayers on <u>June 30, 2023</u> (Section 311 MGA)

What if you do not understand or disagree with your assessment:

Sections 299 and 300 of the *Municipal Government Act* outlines that you, as an assessed person, have a right to obtain sufficient information to show how your property was prepared, as well as a summary of assessment information on other assessed properties for comparison purposes. To review your assessment details or compare to other properties, please contact the **Village of Innisfree** at 780-592-3886 or the **Village Assessor**, **Municipal Planning Services**, **Justin Goudreau** at 1-780-939-3310.

If, after having discussed your assessment details with an assessor, you are still of the opinion that your assessment is incorrect, you may file a written complaint to the Regional Assessment Review Board. Your complaint must set out in detail the reasons you feel the assessment is incorrect. The Clerk of the Regional Assessment Review Board will schedule a hearing at which you will have the opportunity to present evidence.





Innisfree-Minburn 4-H Beef Club Report


We hope to see everyone back for our 2024 year and hope to see some new members join our club as well! This was an amazing year, and I can't wait for next year!







Project Gazebo... by Deb Barber



I know I have provided snippets about the gazebo project but since it is almost completed, I thought I would document

the story for future references.

About three years ago, Farmer Hubby decided to replace a couple of wooden bin floors with hopper bottoms. The wood bottoms were starting to show signs of decay and he decided to address the situation sooner rather than later. Once the bins were set up in their new places, he got to looking at the old bases and decided he simply couldn't throw them away, no self-respecting farmer would throw anything away when it still contained an ounce of usefulness, right? He thought and he pondered and one day he went voila and told me he was going to use one to build a gazebo. I have a great imagination but even with that I simply couldn't see that left over hunk of round wood being turned into a gazebo. But who am I to stand in the way of someone's recycling dreams?

The two bases sat over winter and well into the next summer, I tried to be patient as let's face it they were an eye sore and I still couldn't quite picture one being transformed into a gazebo! After dropping a few delicate hints, Farmer Hubby decided to take the better of the two and start trimming off the rotten wood to see what remained. Well, he pared and he cut and he changed his mind, amended his plans and after a LOT of work presented me with a patchwork of wooden pieces that he proudly proclaimed would be the floor and base. It looked ginormous, I tried to think of ways to have it magically disappear in the night, but day after day it remained starting me in the face.

Over that winter Farmer Hubby spent a lot of time at his desk, paper, pencil, protractor in hand designing and redesigning his plan. With each revision it became more and more elaborate until I was certain he was taking on something that we could never possibly build. But he was adamant that he was going to turn that bin bottom into a perfectly fine, 20 feet across, gazebo.

I finally had to step in and persuade him that I had a few ideas of my own. It certainly wasn't an easy sell and just like myself, he had a hard time envisioning my concept of what the finished project should look like. We made many visits to Home Depot, would come home, pull out the plans and revisit them over and over again.

That year the next step was to figure out the uprights to support the roof. How high, how many, how to secure them to the floor, how to support the spans between them. It was a lot of try this and figure out that. We finally settled on 4x4 brown treated posts, calculations indicated 14 would be the best spacing. Then 4x4 cross supports. Sounds pretty simple on paper but it was definitely one of many challenges we faced, but they all did get put up and then winter was upon us.

After lots of hard convincing he finally decided that perhaps my idea of white, metal railing would be a better answer than a wooden railing. Less upkeep and possibly easier to install. After purchasing the necessary items, discovering that Home Depot no longer carried the exact length we needed, metal saw blade in hand we began. I have to confess if the metal railing was the easier route, I would hate to see how the wooden route might have panned out. Straight rails on a fourteen sided semi round project provided many challenges and heavy discussions (heavy on the heavy!). But with a lot of perseverance and creativity they got put up. As long as no one looks too closely they look pretty good, one of those things from a distance they look better than super close up. But they serve the purpose and it actually was starting to look like it could possibly be a real gazebo.

So that brings us to year three! The roof was something Farmer Hubby had to do on his own, I am a prairie girl through

and through and my feet belong firmly planted on the ground and I don't do heights! Again, some interesting angles were created and cut out of the plywood to get it all pieced together but it did get done.

The structure was a bit wiggly so we added in some black metal brackets and I decided to chose a few that could also serve as plant hangers so the gazebo would have a garden like atmosphere. After those came a few more support pieces and some staining to preserve the wood against the elements. All and all it is finished as much as we can do, we are currently awaiting the contractor to come shingle the roof as that I feel is totally beyond my abilities (remember the height issues?)

We did find some outdoor furniture which is waiting to be assembled once the roofing is completed. All and all I am impressed, I feel like Farmer Hubby accomplished the almost impossible he turned a bin floor into a gazebo. Now just to figure out how to get him to actually sit inside it and enjoy it with me!
