

PLEASE! SLOW DOWN WHEN PASSING OUR SCHOOL

Per Alberta.ca: When you approach a school or play-ground sign, with a maximum speed posted with it, you are entering a school and/or playground zone. You must not exceed the posted speed when the zone is in effect.

The speed limit for both urban and rural school zones and playground zones is 30 km/h unless otherwise posted.



June 20, 2023 - Council Meeting Highlights:

Bylaws

- **Utilities Amendment Bylaw 684-23** was passed; the Bylaw addresses the non-payment of Infrastructure Fees for vacant properties. The new Bylaw requires vacant properties to pay the basic Infrastructure Fees, effective July 1st, that all residential customers are paying on their monthly Utility Invoices:
- o Stormwater Infrastructure Renewal Fee \$ 3.39
- o ACE Regional Water Fee \$15.00
- o Innisfree Water Infrastructure Renewal Fee \$13.00
- Land Use Bylaw Amendment Bylaw 685-23; Council provided first reading to the Bylaw; the Bylaw is addressing the "wording" within Section 3.2 (o) "Developments Not Requiring a Permit" from "the demolition or removal of any structure for which erection a development permit would not be required pursuant to subsections (d) through (k) above, inclusive." To read as follows:
- o "o. the demolition or removal of any building or structure, recorded in subsections (d) through (k) above, do not require a development permit."

Business:

- Council endorsed the donation of several historical items to the Innisfree Bank of Commerce Historical Society.
- Council endorsed the 2023 2025 Strategic Plan
- Council approved the Innisfree Public Library Board Members to record their Board term.
- Council entered into an agreement with MMI-FCSS to paint a mural on the Public Works building.

June 29, 2023 - Special Council Meeting Highlights:

- Council appointed Thelma Rogers as Interim Chief Administrative Officer for the period of June 29th to December 4th, 2023.
- Council endorsed the appointment of Brooke Magosse as the Interim Administrative Assistant for the period of June 29th to December 4th, 2023, per the terms and conditions as discussed.


July 18, 2023 - Regular Council Meeting Minutes:

Bylaw:

- Council approved the Public Meeting for Land Use Bylaw 685-23 to be scheduled for August 15 @ 5 PM. Copies of the amending Bylaw are posted on www.innisfree.ca
- Council approved Unsightly Premises Bylaw 686-23, that is available to view on www.innisfree.ca

Business:

- Council endorsed new signing authorities
- Council approved an amendment to the Solid Waste Management Agreement to add waste removal from the Innisfree Birch Lake Campground & Park.
- Council approved the purchase of a new JD Riding Mower for use at the Innisfree Birch Lake Campground & Park and the sale of the existing Toro riding mower.
- Council accepted a bid for four tires that were posted for sale.
- Council endorsed a motion to contribute any surplus from the July 1st and August 9 Village Pancake Breakfasts, to be divided equally between the Innisfree Prairie Bank of Commerce Historical Society and the Innisfree Senior Citizens Association.

Hello everyone and welcome to berry season! Raspberries seem to be early this year (writing this in July) but if you have access to fresh raspberries or blackberries when you see this you will love this PIE recipe. ENJOY!

GLAZED RASPBERRY PIE

INGREDIENTS:

3 to 4 cups fresh raspberries and 1 cup raspberries for glaze (can be frozen ones) 3/4 cup sugar

3 Tbsp cornstarch

DIRECTIONS:

- -Cook 1 pie shell till golden and then let it cool.
- -Mash the 1 cup raspberries-add water to mashed berries to make 1 cup. Cook approx 3 mins in saucepan.
- -Put mash through strainer to remove seeds. Add water to make juice up to 1 cup again.
- -Mix cornstarch with sugar really well.
- -Add sugar mix to juice and cook until thick and clear.
- -Put fresh raspberries into cooked pie shell
- -Pour thickened juice over berries and let cool well,

Serve with whipped cream.


Note: If you have lots of raspberries you can mash more than 1 cup and you will not need much water or any.


This recipe works just as well with blackberries.

I simply remember my favorite things, And then I don't feel so bad.





Guidelines:

Only those items deemed 'acceptable' will be collected for disposal. Please see the list of 'acceptable' and 'unacceptable' below. Items such as TVs and stereos are acceptable; however, residents are advised against placing electronics at the curb that could contain sensitive information. This program is only available to households who receive waste collection services from the Village.

Accepted Waste:

BAGGED household waste, appliances, metals, tires, wood, pesticide containers, used paint pans & aerosol containers, furniture/mattresses, e-waste (computers, TVs, etc.), agricultural waste (chemical containers for recycling, twine for recycling (in plastic bags), plastic grain bags for recycling (must be rolled), net wrap for landfill disposal (in plastic bags))

Prohibited Waste:

Contractor material, animal carcases, batteries, asphalt shingles (>100 lbs.), plasterboard (>100 lbs.), concrete, used oil, propane tanks, railway ties, vehicle parts.



Innisfree Cemetery Committee Update

The ICC held its AGM on June 14, with the current executive agreeing to remain in their positions: Sheila Whitmore, Chair, Derek Saskiw and Tina Lindballe, Vice-Chairs, Ed and Eileen Hlus, members. Thank you to Sandra Gushnowski for her years of service on the committee. Welcome to Edie Whitten and thank you for joining the committee.

Sadly, we acknowledge the loss of Mr. John Hlushak from the community and our ICC. John was our representative for the Holy Cross Cemetery and liaison with the diocese. After some discussion it was agreed that the ICC would continue to manage the Holy Cross (St. Peter & St Paul Cemetery) in order to provide the community with local representation. We are looking for a representative from the Ukrainian Catholic community to join our committee and continue the necessary liaison with the church.

Please remove faded memorial flowers and objects, and place any floral tributes and objects where they do not pose a hazard to students mowing. Artificial flowers stuck directly into the ground are hazardous. Please use urns attached to memorial stones and platforms.

Once again, Delnorte High School students and parents, under the supervision of Mrs. Nadia Melnyk are maintaining the cemetery grounds. If you have been at the cemetery lately, you will have noticed the usual high standard of maintenance and the well-kept grounds. Thank you, students and parents for doing such a great job in a hot, smokey summer.

You may have also noticed a number of small, grey metal crosses with names on them. Several graves were previously unmarked, although many were listed on our cemetery maps, the original oilskin and first surveyed map of 1953. Keith Whitmore located 50 graves by triangulating with other, marked graves, and confirmed their locations through the use of a rod to find the expected change in ground density that indicates a grave. The marked graves have all been added to the newest surveyed maps of 2018.

The County of Minburn owns the cemetery title and is ultimately responsible for it's location and operation and has worked cooperatively with the ICC. In a response to a letter requesting more funding, County management sent a reply indicating their commitment to the maintenance of the Innisfree Cemetery through, not only a funding increase for this year, but increases for each of the next two years. In addition, the Chair and Vice Chairs of the ICC will meet with county management in early August to establish a more formal management plan of operation. This will make it possible for long term planning and clarify the roles and responsibilities for all parties.







About an Artifact

August 2023

For this month's edition; our forum's second ever, I have chosen a very fascinating artifact which finds its home perched atop a small shelf in with days of old. the Delnorte School room on the second floor of our museum: this antique planetarium has caught the eye of many of our tourists, those of whom first brought my attention to it, its beautiful detail not all obvious upon first glance. The base on which the apparatus stands has a diameter of 21 centimeters, its arm measuring 19.5 centimeters. This specific planetarium depicts only the Sun, which appears to be made of partially-painted or tarnished copper, Earth, a very small, but fully-inscribed globe, and the Moon, a small wooden ball. One hemisphere of the Moon is painted black, the other white, this, I believe, was meant to be a general depiction of the Moon's phases.

One of this artifact's most visually stunning and captivating features is a blue and gold astrological chart bordering the circumference of the base below the Sun. This celestial chart includes each month on the outermost band, the zodiac signs in the center, and the 4 seasons on the innermost band. I find it compelling that we no longer see such charts included on modern day planetariums, that humanity once again more often uses those 12 constellations for means of spirituality than astronomy.


As you could have assumed, this planetarium had been used in Innisfree School, and until it's donation to our museum in 1999 by the Innisfree Agricultural Society, it had been stored in "the old white school" what is now the Millenium Building here in Innisfree. The device became the property of the Agricultural Society when the building was purchased from Buffalo Trail Regional School Division. Though there is no date or manufacturing stamp on the artifact, nor any other information to determine its age, based on inspection and research on the globe, I can estimate that it was made

around the late 1920s. Unfortunately, with the instrument being as old as it is assumed to be, the planets can no longer rotate. At the time of its use though, urning the arm around the base would result in the Moon orbiting the Earth, which would rotate on its tilted axis, the Sun slowly rotating in synchronization.

To be further enriched with the wonders and realities of history, please consider visiting our local Prairie Bank Museum for a guided tour.

History of the "29" Cribbage Board

The first number "29" crib board was originated by Mr. Edward Hirst of Burnaby, British Columbia, in 1953. At the age of 28 Mr. Hirst was overcome by polio, which left him paralyzed from the hips down, and as a consequence confined to a wheelchair. It was under these conditions that Mr. Hirst turned to his woodworking ability to produce a livelihood for his young family. From a number of items which he was able to design and produce came the "29" crib board, which proved to be a most popular item, not only with cribbage players but with everyone who saw it.

However, many people who wanted a "29" board were unable to buy one, because of the very limited quantity which Mr. Hirst was able to manufacture personally. Following Mr. Hirst's death in 1960 no further supplies were available until early in 1962, at which time production of the new "29" board was undertaken by another Vancouver manufacturer.

Edward Hirst was the first husband of former Innisfree resident Mrs. Vera Spurr and the father of Innisfree resident Mrs. Gayle Foyster and grandfather to Naomi Foyster-Melnyk.

During some of the continuous heat wave there were days that some plants required

Apparently, tomatoes don't mind the heat as they have been busy producing and in my opinion nothing beats a ripe tomato plucked from the vine and eaten right there in the garden! For the first time in as long as I can recall I finally was able to grow some rosy, red radishes that were not wormy or fiery hot and the onions are coming in plump and delicious too.

After not having any gold finches come visit last year, we have been pleasantly surprised to have a flock of ten to fifteen that show up daily at the 'all you can eat' sunflower buffet I put out. We also get visited daily by George the Fourth or possibly Fifth squirrel (the cats have figured out how to catch squirrels, so they live in peril and often provide the cats with a tasty meal). I don't mind the squirrels until they decide to dig through my flowerpots uprooting my plants and then I allow the cats to proceed with open warfare on them! We also seem to have accrued a friendly crow; he comes to the buffet daily as well but has negotiate a truce with the finches as they all eat together like one big family.

The hummingbirds have been demanding tenants happily letting me know when the feeders are either empty or have become stale. I hang three feeders and it never ceases to amaze me that they all must eat

from the same feeder at the same time ensuing in a battle of the bullets. Also, for the first time I have seen them in the canola field flitting from flower to flower, I did not realize that they liked canola nectar and it has been fascinating watching them.

The gazebo has finally come to completion with the roof newly shingled complete with cupola, planter baskets hung around the entrance archways and the furniture assembled and placed inside. I have discovered that my barn cat Pinkie is convinced that this wonder was built specifically with him in mind and whenever I take a moment to sit inside it and just relax, he is right there to have a chat with me.

July and August are the months for all the small-town fairs, with parades, bench shows, cattle/horse shows and all kinds of delicious and fattening foods. I hope everyone has the opportunity to attend at least one or two as it is a great time to reconnect with family, neighbours and friends.
