Finally, I hope your harvest has been plentiful and your days filled with sunshine.



COUNCIL approved First Reading to Rescinding Bylaw (1911 – 2004) 688-23 on September 19, 2023.

BY-LAW 688-23, OF THE VILLAGE OF INNISFREE IN THE PROVINCE OF ALBERTA, FOR THE PURPOSE OF RESCINDING OUTDATED AND IRRELEVANT BYLAWS FROM 1911-2004, FOR THE VILLAGE OF INNISFREE

WHEREAS, under the provisions of the *Municipal Government Act*, RSA 2000, Chapter M-26, and amendments thereto, the Council has been granted the authority to pass bylaws for municipal purposes; and

WHEREAS several bylaws have become irrelevant in nature, updated, or replaced over time, without the old bylaws being properly rescinded, specifically for the period of 1911-2004.

Civic Addressing Bylaw 689-23

The purpose of the Civic Addressing Bylaw 689-23 is to establish a civic addressing and street naming system, and to regulate the display of civic addresses to identify properties and to accommodate the delivery of municipal and emergency services.

The Village of Innisfree does not have a civic addressing and street naming system in place. This bylaw will address that problem and mitigate the issues with identifying properties for emergency (AHS & Fire) and municipal services.

Council will be addressing the third reading of Civic Addressing Bylaw 689-23 at their regular Council meeting on October 17, 2023.

GREAT PUMPKIN PIE

- INGREDIENTS:
- 1 15 oz can (about 2 c) pumpkin puree
 3 large eggs
 1 and ¼ cups brown sugar
 1 T cornstarch
 ½ tsp salt
 1 and ½ tsp cinnamon

½ tsp ginger
¼ tsp nutmeg
1/8 tsp ground cloves
1/8 tsp black pepper
1 cup heavy cream
¼ cup milk

Pastry or storebought crust Whipping cream, cool whip or or ice cream

DIRECTIONS:

- 1. Preheat oven to 375 degrees.
- Whisk pumpkin, 3 eggs and brown sugar together until combined.
 Add cornstarch, salt, ginger, nutmeg, cloves, pepper, cream and
- milk. Whisk vigorously until everything is combined.
- 4. Prebake pie crust for 10 mins using parchment paper and pie weights inside.
- 5. After 10 mins remove paper and weights and pour in filling. Bake pie until centre is almost set, about 55 to 60 mins.

6. Halfway through baking cover crust with pie crust shield or tin foil.

7. Once cooked put on wire rack to cool completely, about 3 hours. Serve with whipped cream, cool whip or even ice cream

Skylynn



WATER METER INSTALLATION PROJECT

The Village received approval to fund the *Water Meter Rehabilitation Project* under



A Canada Community Building Fund grant in 2022; the CCBF grant financed the entire project! The Village received the new meters, finally, in March 2023. Since then, the Village has promoted the installation of the new meters. However, the response to the promotion has been slow and there were some installation difficulties, that have been "ironed out."

The new meters are slimmer, have updated technology and enhanced battery life components that have been extensively tested and should serve their purpose for the next 20 – 25 years.

The Village Administration Staff will be formatting the locations of the properties, block by block, that require a new meter.

Starting the week of October 10th, right after the Thanksgiving long weekend, the Village will be scheduling meter installations for each location identified.

Meter installation is <u>free</u> to the resident; it should only take 20 - 30 minutes to replace a meter.



I know what you are thinking, Deb school just started it will be a while before report cards

will be issued! Well, just hang tough and see where I plan to go with this.

A little bit ago I was listening to the radio, and they were interviewing the winner of their Meals In The Field event. They asked the farm wife they were speaking with what she would like to share with the non farming sector about farm life. She paused and said she couldn't really think of anything right off the top of her head. I decided that was a very good question and decided to spend sometime pondering what I would want to share. This is what I came up with.

To our non farming friends, neighbours and relatives; what would we like to share with you about our farm life? I think what comes most fore front to my mind is that we do this job with passion. We are invested in our farm no matter if it is grain, livestock, poultry, vegetable and it goes on and on.

The grain farmer has a deep respect for Mother Nature because at the end of the day she holds all the cards. She can send the right conditions to grow a bumper crop and in a flash of lightening and hail wipe it completely out! Farmers spend a great deal of time gazing into the sky trying to determine what action they should take next. They try to balance keeping the soil nutritionally balanced, fertilized

for maximum yield, weed control that doesn't damage the native vegetation, insecticides that don't wipe out the beneficial insects. At the end of the day very little is in our control, but we continue on, week after week, month after month and year after year. Our report card is as individual as what we produce, but I believe we are determined to do the very best to meet the criteria of feeding the world and keeping the planet healthy as well.

It's been a long time since I worked in the cattle industry. However, I am sure not much has changed. Ranchers continue to ensure their animals are feed the best feed they can grow or purchase. Long nights are spent during calving season, when water is in short supply, they spend hours hauling water to various pastures. Each animal's individual characteristics is what makes them unique and special, each and everyone is valued. Most Ranchers can give you a complete history about any of their animals!

I grew up on a broiler poultry farm. Seven thousand chickens were rotated through the two barns on a six-week cycle. My mom lived in the barns, ensuring proper temperature controls were in place for the baby chicks and that water was always available and food balanced and ample. In those days mortality records were given a high priority and my mom several times during the years we raised the birds had the lowest mortality rate in all of Alberta.

I would want people to understand that days are not measured in hours,
