



October 17, 2023 Council Meeting Highlights Organizational & Regular Council Meeting

Annual Organizational Meeting

- Elections for office were conducted:
 - o Mayor Evan Raycraft
 - o Deputy Mayor Deborah McMann
 - o Councillor Jennifer Johnson
- Council maintained their respective Committee Representations
- Council maintained the existing Councillor remunerations for the next year.

Regular Council Meeting:

Bylaws:

- Following a Public Hearing, held before the reading of the Bylaw, Rescinding Bylaw (1911 2004) 688-23 was passed.
- Civic Addressing Bylaw 689-23 was endorsed by Council.

New Business:

- Council endorsed the Village as the Managing Partner for a 2023-2024 Alberta Community Partnership Grant for a Regional Water Services Reservoir Assessment Project in the amount of \$200,000, for the Alberta Central East Regional Water Corporation, in partnership with the County of Minburn.
- Council directed Administration to secure IT and Cyber Security Services for the Village and report progress back to Council.
- Council directed Administration to contract the Administration building rehabilitation to Premier Fire & Flood Restoration Inc. per the Alberta Municipal Corporation Services approved insurance quote of \$40,827.97. Further, Council directed Administration to provide the revised Scope of Work, developed by the Village to the Contractor and seek quotes for the work.
- Council approved the donation of one weekend of camping, with power, at the Innisfree Birch Lake Park & Campground to the Innisfree "Christmas in the Hallway" fundraiser.
- Council approved the sale of two Tax Forfeiture properties, contingent on a requirement to sign a Memorandum of Understanding for redevelopment of the properties.

With the cold weather upon us I immediately thought of comfort food and that makes me think of potatoes so I'm including a recipe for my easy to make Scalloped Potatoes. Hope you will try them! By the way they are delicious as leftovers!

SCALLOPED POTATOES

INGREDIENTS:

4 or 5 large yellow potatoes (or a few more)

1 yellow onion sliced thinly

¼ cup butter

¼ cup flour

1 can Mushroom soup

1 can milk

Water as needed

DIRECTIONS:

- -Peel potatoes and slice thin. In a bowl combine soup and milk and mix well.
- -Grease (with marg) a medium casserole dish and put in a layer of potato slices and some onion slices.
- -Sprinkle with a bit of the flour and dot with a bit of the butter. Sprinkle with salt and pepper but **lightly** on the salt as soup does contain salt.
- -Continue to do layers till all potato used etc.
- -Then pour soup mix over the whole casserole of potato, cover with foil or lid and bake till done, approx 1 to 1 ½ hours at 400° F








WATER METER INSTALLATION PROJECT






